THE HIGH COST OF LIVING

HITS JURORS AND THEY ASK INCREASE IN PAY

Allowance of \$2.50 a Day Not Sufficient and Recommend That it be Increased at Least to \$4 a Day.

"In our opinion the allowance to jurors of \$2.50 a day is not sufficient, owing to the high cost of living, and we would recommend that it be increased at least to \$4 a day."

This appeared in the report of the grand jury, at the County Court sessions, presided over by Judge Leavelle, and which was presented to the court on Thursday morning. Andrew McFadden was the foreman of the jury.

The report also contained the following: "We regret that we had to find a true bill against two persons in two cases that came before us, but we are glad that there were no others on the docket which speaks well for the general morals of the community."

"We visited the institution here and mentioned, viz. County Jail, Court House, House of Industry, House of Providence, Hotel Dieu, General Hospital, and the Orphan's Home.

"We are pleased to note the splendid condition of the County Jail. It is a model of cleanliness, the out-buildings are maintained in perfect condition.

"There are thirteen men and two women at present confined there, and we found the discipline perfect and the sanitary arrangements very good. The jailor, sergeant Joseph Hawkey, who was recently appointed, is taking a keen interest in the jail management, and no doubt his military experience will result in good discipline.

"We take pleasure in complimenting the sheriff and janitor on the cleanliness and order of the Court House.

"We found everything in good order at the House of Industry and at the House of Providence, and ample accommodation for the many old people housed there.

"We visited the Hotel Dieu and found the patients very comfortably placed and well cared for, the wards being bright and airy; from all appearances it is well managed.

"We were cordially received at the General Hospital by the superintendent and everybody looked as neat and clean as possible, but we could see that there were many improvements that were needed, but could not be done for lack of funds. We would, therefore, recommend that all the charitable institutions should have larger grants than they at present receive as they are doing an immense amount of good.

THREE YEARS IN PRISON

JOSEPH ROGERS SENTENCED ON A CHARGE OF ABDUCTION.

Came Before Judge Leavelle at Opening of County Court Sessions Thursday Morning—Counsel Made Plea for Leniency.

Three years in the Portsmouth penitentiary was the sentence imposed upon Joseph Rogers, found guilty of abducting Eva, the fifteen-year-old daughter of John Cameron of Catawaqui. His Honor passed sentence when the county court sessions resumed on Thursday morning.

The prisoner had nothing to say on his own behalf, and appeared somewhat dazed as the sentence was announced. His counsel, Ambrose Shea, made an appeal on his behalf, stating that he was the father of a large family, that he had six children under the age of fifteen years depending on him for support.

Judge Leavelle stated that he had not imposed sentence on the prisoner on Wednesday, as he wanted to make sure that he was justified in taking the serious view he did of the matter. After due consideration, his view had not been altered.

Continuing, Judge Leavelle stated that there were men who appeared to think lightly over offences against women. In the case of the prisoner there were no extenuating circumstances, whatever, and his Honor characterized his conduct as contemptible. He had considered the plea of counsel about his having a family to look after, but he did not consider that the prisoner even if given a chance, would give his family the proper attention he should.

The criminal code provided for a sentence of five years for such a crime, but he did not feel justified in imposing the maximum penalty. He would make the sentence three years.

Eva Cameron, the girl in the case, was taken to the Alexandria school for girls in Toronto on Wednesday night by Constable Nicholas Timmerman.

The case is one in which the local Children's Aid Society took action, and worked on, and it was as a result of the work of the society and the police that Rogers was taken in charge.
