FOR THEIR MILK, SAYS THE HON. DR. TOMLIE

Strongly Commends Mixed Farming to Ontario Agriculturists—Great Field for Development Before Canadian Breeders of Animals. Guelph, Dec. 11.—"Any farmer who gets up at 4 or 5 o'clock every morning to milk his cows, who attends to them seven days in the week and who has all the expense of putting his product on the market under prevailing conditions, is entitled to every cent he ever got for milk in this country," declared Hon. Dr. Tomlie, Minister of Agriculture for the Dominion, speaking at the directors' luncheon in connection with the Ontario Winter Fair. "I am tired hearing all this talk of profiteering. I am getting so that I say to the men who indulge in it: 'Why don't you go and produce milk? If there is such big money in it, why don't you give up your barbed shop?' but they don't go."

In a careful review of the agricultural situation in Canada the Minister touched upon some of its outstanding features in a manner that brought responsive applause from the two hundred farmer exhibitors who crowded the dining hall. He opened his remarks by congratulating the officials upon the success of the Winter Fair, not only on this occasion, but in former years. As an instance of the advertising value of the Fair, he recognized the purchases of Canadian purebred animals by United States breeders, following the winning of the championship at the International by animals that had graduated from the judging ring at Guelph.

Recommends Mixed Farming. "Perhaps one of the greatest responsibilities developing upon the Federal and Provincial Departments of Agriculture is the encouragement of a system of mixed farming that will give the best results in old settled areas," the speaker declared. "In my opinion, such a system is one based on live stock, mixed farming with live stock as its basis. In Great Britain they have created and maintained more breeds of horses, cattle, sheep and swine than in all the rest of the world together, and as a result they can produce to-day a higher yield of wheat per acre than we can in Canada. I propose to use all my efforts as Minister in furthering the promotion of mixed farming based on purebred live stock."

Dr. Tomlie quoted statistics showing the great field for development that lay before Canadian breeders of horses, cattle, sheep and swine. In the realization of the immense possibilities he saw the importance

of co-operative marketing, good road system, better live stock and better rural education.

He had seen, on a recent occasion, animals being slaughtered at a Toronto abattoir, and had remarked upon the poor quality of the product. Carcasses ran, in weight, from 200 to 325 pounds, instead of from 500 to 600 pounds, a condition that reflected an appalling waste in handling, he thought. "There has been little judgment used in marketing these animals," the speaker went on. "We must see that the producer is supplied with such information as will enable him to market to the best advantage and with a minimum of loss and wastage. There wasn't one first-class carcass in the whole lot that went through the abattoir concerned in that day."

Poor Stuff Doesn't Pay. "We have too many four-thousand-pound cows in Canada and too few thirty thousand pounders. We in the West are disappointed when we learn that 47 per cent of all the bulls in use in Ontario are scrubs. We look to Ontario for our mission-aries, our moral reformers, our farming experts, and our purebred stock. The poor stuff doesn't pay. The man who works day after day attending the four-thousand-pound cows has nothing at the end of the year but his expense, the fresh air and the fertilizer. I congratulate the Provincial Minister of Agriculture on the energetic steps being taken in Ontario to eliminate scrub sires, and I want to assure him and you that I shall do everything possible to assist in that work, realizing, as I do, its extreme importance to the Province and to the Dominion."

TO HOLD SPECIAL MEETING.

It is said that, in addition to the regular quarterly dividend of five per cent, a substantial bonus will be declared upon the stock. Well-informed opinion is to the effect that this special disbursement will be in excess of five per cent, and, this being the case, Nipissing will have established a record annual disbursement, as only one extra dividend of five per cent, has been paid this year.
