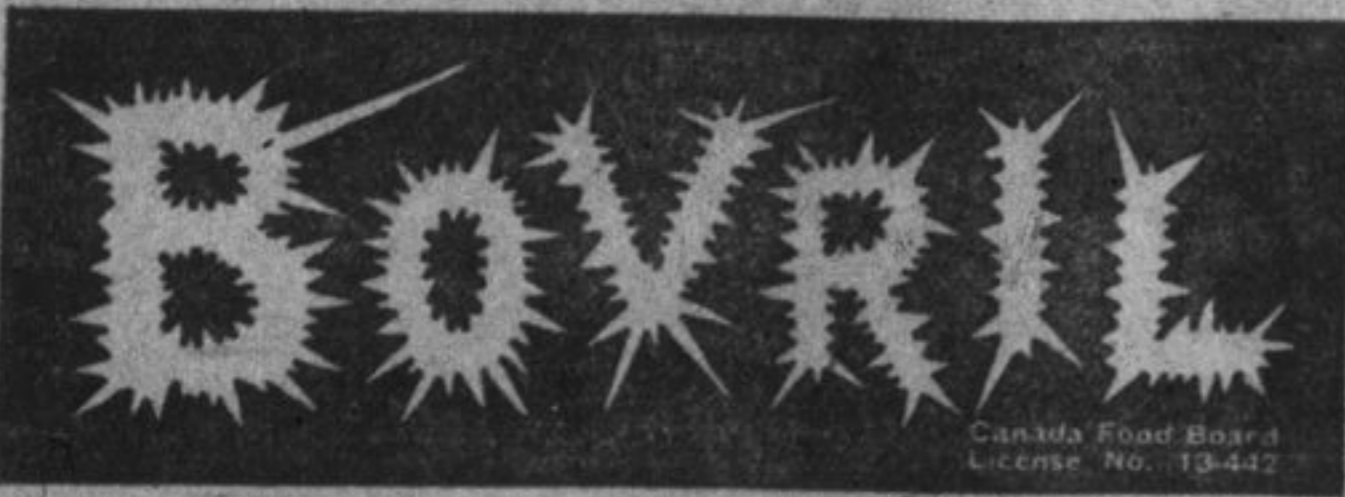

### FINE FOR GETTING DRUNK.

Quantities of Hard Liquor Were Regulated in 1809. In the first constitution of the first temperance society formed in New York State in 1809 there appeared a by-law which acted as a deterrent on whiskey drinkers. It stated: "Any member of this association who shall be convicted of intoxication shall be fined a quarter of a dollar except such act of intoxication shall take place on the Fourth of July or any other regularly appointed military muster." There were likewise provisions regulating the amount of hard liquor a householder could keep in store at his home for events like christenings, weddings, funerals (wakes), etc., which, if they were observed, as it is likely they were not, must have wrought hardship to so-called moderate drinkers' households. A quart of whiskey and a gallon of hard cider was esteemed sufficient for a party numbering twenty-five, and such a party represented either a wedding or a wake. Greater leeway was permitted when the hilarious occasion was a christening, for here the happy and presumably proud father who acted up to his promise to the temperance society might entertain with its permission twice that number of guests and "set up" the drinks almost ad lib.
