THE MACHINE GUN COMPANY INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

IS PREPARING FOR A BIG ACTIVE WINTER

It Will Engage In Indoor Sports as Well as Machine Gun Instruction—Meeting on Thursday Night.

A meeting of the three batteries of the Kingston Company, Machine Gun Brigade, took place on Thursday night on a business trip. The batteries are, Army and Navy mobile battery, G.W.V.A. battery, and the city battery. All of the officers were present, and Major H. F. Richardson, son of the late Senator Henry Richardson, was appointed to command the Kingston battery. His appointment is a most popular one.

Captain John Edwards, brigade adjutant, presided. The A. and N. and the G.W.V.A. batteries were reported, as being recruited up to strength, but the city battery has yet to be recruited. Major P. G. C. Campbell, O.C., Machine Gun Brigade and Major P. Willer, D.S.O., M.C., second in command, were present at the meeting, also Col. Walker, officer commanding the machine gun corps in Canada.

Lieut. Melville Lemmon has been appointed brigade signalling officer. Capt. W. E. Swaine is quartermaster and transport officer.

CONFERENCES TAKE PLACE BETWEEN THE BUSINESS MEN AND LABOR LEADERS

With Regard to Municipal Election Candidates—These Two Bodies May Nominate a Citizen For Mayor.

Definite form has been given to the business men's campaign in the coming civic elections. The candidates selected for aldermen, the Utilities Commission and the Board of Education are to be given strong support as their election is deemed to be in the best interests of the city.

There have been conferences between the business men and labor, with a view to securing definite support, and while nothing definite has been handed over for publication, it is stated that there is every likelihood that an understanding will be reached respecting the candidate for mayor. Two men have been prominently mentioned as business men's candidates, and labor is reported as being solidly behind one of them. Petitions are being circulated on behalf of the candidates, and there appears every likelihood that this date that H. C. Nickle, the veterans' candidate, will have opposition.

Not in years have the business men shown such activity over the civic elections, and it is generally admitted that they can elect any candidates they choose. The list of proposed aldermen has not yet been completed, but the candidates for the Utilities, R. F. Elliott and Mayor H. W. Newman, have accepted the nomination.
