WILL NOT MAKE PROMISES

PREMIER DRURY HEARS THE HYDRO-ELECTRIC DEPUTATION.

He Wants to Be Assured First That the Existing Railways Are Not to Be Duplicated.

Toronto, Dec. 12.—Through sympathy with the projects of the Hydro-Electric Commission and confidence in Sir Adam Beck, coupled with some fears that the proposed radial lines might possibly duplicate existing lines, all this was expressed by Premier Drury this morning in an interview with three hundred representatives of hydro municipalities in various parts of the province.

The deputation submitted a resolution that the term of office of Sir Adam Beck be six years, and that the Commission consist of five members, for such terms as would ensure the continuity of the board. Secretary Conington presented arguments and I. W. Lyon, of Guelph, urged that Sir Adam should not have a shorter term than the chairman of the Dominion Railway Board, who is appointed for ten years.

Premier Drury, in reply, characterized himself as an outstanding believer in Ontario water powers and their development. He regarded Sir Adam as like Niagara Falls, a great force, but declined to make any promises just at present. The Legislature must consider the Hydro Radial project. In view of the coming nationalization of railways, it would not do to go ahead with railways that were in the duplication.

Mr. Lyon replied that the radial project did not propose to duplicate, but electricity steam lines. Premier Drury mentioned the projected lines from Galt, Brantford and Guelph, and from Brantford to London, as apparently duplicating existing lines. He wanted to be assured that they were not.

Y. M. C. A. BOYS' DIVISION

The Mothers' Council Greatly Pleased With the Work.

The Mothers' Council of the Y.M.C.A. Boys' Division met Friday afternoon. In the absence of the president Mrs. George Bateman, Mrs. Rodney presided. A very helpful reading was given by Mrs. Carr-Harris. The dining room has been redecorated. A new metallic ceiling in the intermediate game room has been done at the expense of the Mothers' Council under the direction of Mrs. Geo. Wright. The boys' division was visited by the mothers of the council and they were pleased with the work that had been done and the general appearance of the boys' division and expressed themselves grateful in favor of the place the Y.M.C.A. has taken in the life of the city boys.

Plans were made for the sleigh drive which takes place during the Christmas holidays. The report of the month was given by S. T. Lilley, boys' work secretary which showed a big increase over the same month of last year.

Underwent an Operation.

Mrs. John Eamer and Aberdeen Clark, Cornwall, spent several days in Kingston, to see their brother, Ernest Clark, who underwent a serious operation at the Sydenham Military Hospital. Mr. Clark injured his head while going overseas a few years ago and was in hospital for a few months after reaching England. The injury had caused so much trouble recently that an operation was considered necessary. Mr. Clark's condition is quite satisfactory.

Is a Kingstonian

R. W. Clewio, secretary to Mayor Church, of Toronto, has resigned, but the Mayor has persuaded him to continue his duties for another month. Mr. Clewio has been in the civic service since 1888. At the end of the year he will retire from active life. He is a thirty-third degree Mason. Mr. Clewio will remain in his post until the New Year, and probably for some time thereafter. He is a native of Kingston, and is well-known to quite a number of citizens.

Woolful Prices For Poultry.

Wednesday and Thursday were turkey fair days in Perth and the prices were woolful to put it mild. On Wednesday turkeys sold at from 47 cents per pound and on Thursday reached 51 cents. The top price for geese was 35 cents and for chickens 40 cents. Ten year buck turkeys were sold at 18 to 20 cents, geese 13 and 13 1/2 cents and chickens from 13 to 17 cents. Those were the good old days, says the Courier.

Ask Increased Queen's Grant.

A deputation from Queen's University, including Wm. Nickle, K. C., and Brig.-Gen. Ross, waited on Premier Drury at Toronto on Friday to request an additional grant of \$40,000 to be used: Arts, \$25,000, science \$10,000, mining \$5,000. It was pointed out that of 505 high school teachers, 247 were graduates of Queen's, and 53 of the 93 school inspectors.
