 Out of 120 pupils in the Gananoque High School only twenty are from the country. The Board is willing to teach agriculture if there is sufficient demand for it.

**Appointed to Help Returned Men.**  
 The Information and Service Branch of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, has appointed F. W. Meigs as their Gananoque representative.

**Lectured on Thursday Evening.**  
 Father J. J. O'Gorman lectured to a large audience at Notre Dame Hall on Thursday evening under the auspices of the Newman Club. His subject was "The Canadian Nation."

**Must Be Vaccinated.**  
 After Monday, no pupils are to be admitted to the Napanee school without a certificate of vaccination, and ten days thereafter all pupils must produce a certificate of successful vaccination, or immunity.

**On Bench in Khaki.**  
 Kingston's acting magistrate, R. E. Kent, appeared on the bench on Friday in khaki. He had a meeting of officers to attend at the armouries in the morning, and after attending this meeting went on the bench.

**Sergt. Leaden Injured.**  
 Sergt. Frederick Leaden, 14 Dufferin street, while cranking a car at the A. S. C. garage on Barrack street Friday, sustained a severe injury. The crank slipped and struck him on the head necessitating medical attention.

**To Enlarge Market.**  
 Pembroke council feels disposed to enlarge the market there, and will submit a by-law to the people in January for the purchase of the old Victoria Hotel property for \$6,000 and a lot in rear of the old Bank of Ottawa property for the same figure.

**Canadian Club Luncheon.**  
 Principal R. Bruce Taylor, Queen's, was the guest of the Canadian Club of Hamilton last evening at the luncheon held in the Royal Connaught. He spoke on the problems and opportunities of the present day citizenship in Canada.

**Hotel At Thousand Island Park.**  
 H. W. Kreuzberg, Cincinnati, O., new owner of the controlling interest of the Thousand Island Park Association, plans to have constructed at the park a modern fire proof hotel of from 300 to 400 rooms, making it one of the largest hotels in the Thousand Islands section.

**\$1,300 For Cobourg Hospital.**  
 A house-to-house canvas made at Cobourg by ladies of the town for the Cobourg Hospital resulted in more than \$800 being raised towards maintenance for the coming year. This, added to subscriptions received from the hospital's summer friends, will make a total offering of over \$1,300.

**Pleased Over Cup.**  
 The boys at the Collegiate Institute were pleased to learn that Trustee L. C. Lockett had offered a cup for competition among the hockey teams of the various forms. The boys are looking forward to a great hockey season and are very glad to know that the Board has granted money for the starting of a rink.

**Sent to Penitentiary.**  
 Thomas Short, owner of the candy shop on Queen street west, Toronto, was found guilty of a charge of defiling his premises, and was sentenced to two years in penitentiary. In passing sentence, Judge Coatsworth said, "I am sorry to say the law only allows me to send you to the penitentiary for two years. I would like to send you there for five years."

**"Cough Drops" Are Medicine.**  
 "Cough drops," tablets sold for the relief of coughs, sore throats, etc., are a medicine, despite the fact that they are sometimes sold in bulk the same as candy, according to the ruling of the Inland Revenue Department, and as such must bear the correct amount of war tax stamps upon each package sold. Other articles, such as camphorated chalk, come under a similar ruling.

**Friends Urge His Claims.**  
 For the position of chairman of the T. & N.O. Railway, prominent business men of Northern Ontario urge the selection of Lieut.-Col. R. F. Rogers, C.E., D.S.O. They declare that he is pre-eminently well qualified for such a post, and point to his record both in the army and in civil life. In 1892 Col. Rogers graduated from the Royal Military College. From 1896 to 1915 he was assistant to the president and general superintendent of the Coniagas mine at Cobalt. In May, 1905, Col. Rogers

joined the Canadian army, being given a commission and authorized to raise No. 1 Tunneling Corps. He was granted the D.S.O. for efficient and valuable services with the forces.

**Approve Mothers' Pension.**  
 At a conference in Toronto of the Ontario provincial committee of the National Council of Women, in dealing with the question of mothers' allowances, Mrs. Bruce Taylor, Kingston, spoke of the state insurance, which has been adopted in England, and which largely does away with the need of mothers' pensions. It was moved by Mrs. L. A. Hamilton and second by Lady Falconer, that the provincial committee approve of the scheme of mothers' pensions, or some alternative scheme such as state insurance.

**Deed Which Won M. C.**  
 The following citation of the award of the Military Cross to Major Howard W. Taylor, Canadian Field Artillery, Gananoque, has just appeared in a supplement of the London Gazette: "On September 27th, 1918, near Tilloy, he, with his battery, pressed forward and came into action within 800 yards of the enemy, thereby greatly assisting the infantry to advance by destroying machine gun nests which were occasioning them great annoyance. He had two horses killed under him,

but set a fine example of dash and determination throughout."

**A Marriage Anniversary.**  
 Major Clyde Scott on his return from Halifax spent a day in Perth, and George Scott, Brantford, on a business trip east, was in Perth with his little daughter, Janice, over Sunday. They expect to return along with other members of St. Andrew's Manse household to share in the reunion that is to mark the fortieth anniversary of the marriage of their father and mother. Dr. and Mrs. Scott were married by the late Principal Tanner on Christmas eve, 1879.

After a lingering illness there passed away at her home just south of Frankville on Tuesday a most highly respected resident in Mrs. D. C. Eaton, whose name before marriage was Miss Lena Niblock.
