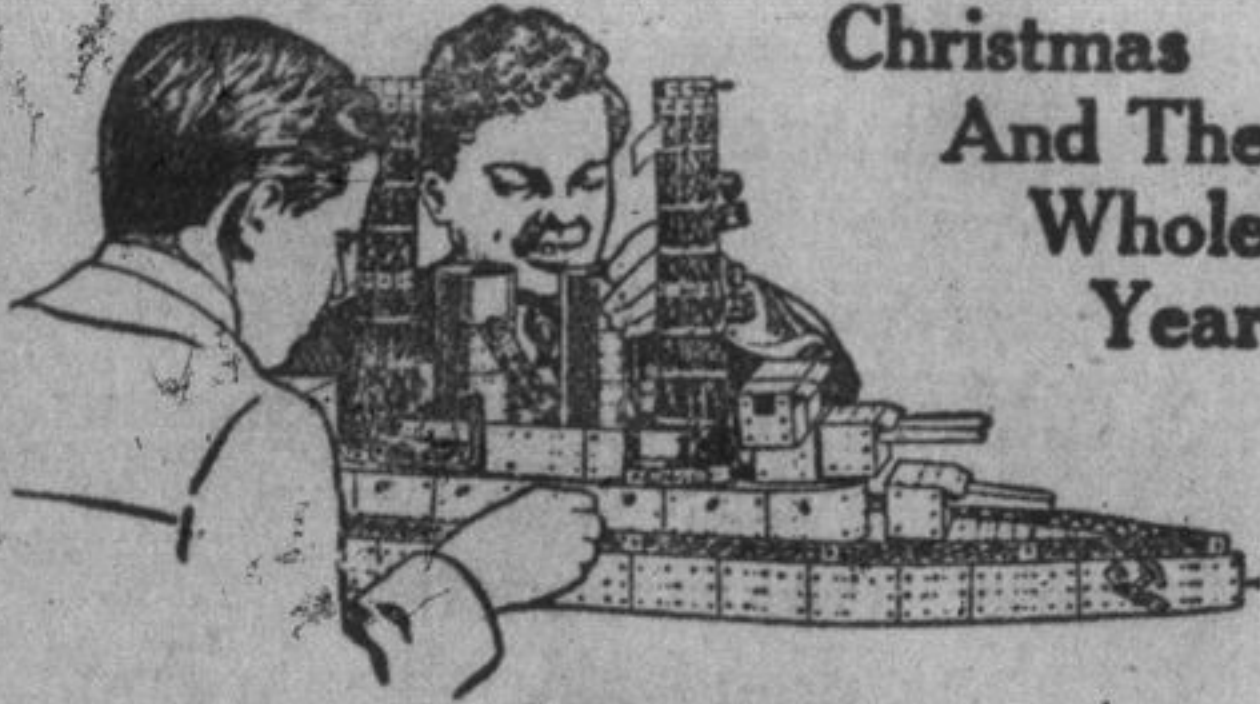

WILL GET RUDE AWAKENING.

Carpenter's Supporters Think Dempsey No Match For Him.

A New York despatch says: According to reports from England, Georges Carpenter's followers seem to be of the opinion that Jack Dempsey is an uncouth slugger of the Joe Beckett type, and no match for the Frenchman in the matter of science.

On the other hand, America's boxing fans in general believe that it would be nothing short of a crime to match the slender Frenchman with the hard-hitting champion.

Both views of the matter probably are considerably distorted. Dempsey certainly is not to be compared with third-rate Beckett in any way, but it is by no means certain that Carpenter would be a mere push over for Jess Willard's conqueror.

To argue that because the giant Willard was beaten in a few minutes by Dempsey's tremendous wallops, Carpenter, a smaller man than Dempsey, would be hopelessly outclassed, is all wrong, if there is anything in the science of boxing.

Football Notes.

Frank Nighbor, of Pembroke, considered the greatest forward in the game, is again under contract to play with Ottawa in the National Hockey League.

Charlie Querrie is still angling for a number of crack Toronto amateurs who have been burning things up in the O.H.A. Torontos will likely announce the personnel of their team about the latter part of this week.

Ottawa tried to get Cameron from the Torontos at the meeting of the N.H.L., but Querrie insisted on a player in exchange.

The decision of the O.H.A. to allow the intermediates to play off with the senior winners is a good one. The series between the teams is not controlled by the Allan Cup trustees, but the O.H.A., and the winner will represent the O.H.A. in the Allan Cup competition.

The O.H.A. should adopt a player limit rule, says the Toronto Telegram. It would prevent some clubs from signing up all and sundry players and keeping them inactive when other clubs might use them. It would also tend to increase the number of teams.

Ottawa Emulates Alberta. A commotion was caused in Ottawa sport circles by the announcement that the Ottawa Amateur Athletic Federation is granting many reinstatements. It is evidently following the example of the Alberta Provincial body.

Frankie Hearn, one of the best home men of the Ottawa lacrosse team in the National Union, who was formerly with Brantford, has been reinstated and is now eligible for the city hockey league; also Tommy Shields, another member of the Ottawa lacrosse club, who will play amateur hockey in the city league.

A number of others who were prominent heretofore in professional sport have also been reinstated by Capt. Archibald's new federation, and many applications for white-wash are pouring in to Secretary Healy of the federation.

The federation claims control locally and announces that these recommendations will be recognized by any branch of the Amateur Athletic Union.

Dempsey Not Surprised. Jack Dempsey, heavyweight champion said that Georges Carpenter's victory over Joe Beckett in London was no surprise to him, as he and his manager, Jack Kearns, had selected the French champion to win.

"I am ready to box Carpenter or any other man in the world, if I get my price," said Dempsey.
