A. E. Caiman, president of the new Canadian Weekly Newspaper Association and editor of the Picton Gazette, has been nominated by the Eastern Ontario Municipal Hydro-Electric Power Union as Eastern Ontario's prospective member of the Provincial Hydro Commission.

Hon. Mr. Doherty Would be Opposed.
The Renfrew Mercury has heard nothing of John Carty, M.P.P., for South Renfrew, resigning his seat in favor of Hon. Mr. Doherty. The Mercury adds that if he does so then in all probability Mr. Doherty would be opposed.

Her Niece Recovering.
Mrs. Wilfrid Eastwood, Gananoque, spending some time with her little niece, Ileen Hyland, who went through a serious operation for appendicitis in Kingston General Hospital, has returned home. Her niece is gaining nicely.

Wants Hours and Salary.
Mayor Bolam, Renfrew, says if he is wanted for a second term he will accept on one condition that a certain number of hours be set aside each day for town business, and that an honorarium of \$500 be paid. The work at present precludes any private life.

To Speak in New York.
Nelson Parlson, M.P.P., for Prince Edward county, the next speaker of the Ontario Legislature when it assembles next February, has been invited to address the Canadian Club of New York on "Farmers' Movement in Ontario." He will visit the metropolis early in January, for that purpose.

Heavy Liquor Shipment.
Inspectors Taber and Sykes, Brockville, shipped to the department headquarters distributing station at Toronto a consignment of assorted liquors weighing over two tons, valued at \$2,000 wholesale price. The consignment consisted of 75 gallons of bulk goods and 740 bottles which had been seized by the inspectors since early in November.

Prosecuting for Bankruptcy.
An involuntary petition in bankruptcy has been filed against the Clayton, N.Y., Ship and Boat Building Corporation. The concern built boats for the government, but so far payments have been held up on technicalities. It has asked to be regarded as bankrupt so that its creditors may be protected alike. It is hoped to arrange for a reorganization.

Expansion in Prescott.
The Prescott Journal refers to the rumored sale of the Newell Manufacturing Co.'s premises in Water street there to the Mint Products Co. who, it is said, have also purchased the Purkis property to the east of the Newell factory. The Newell Co. it adds, expects to secure a portion of the former distillery property in the west end in order to provide for necessary extension of their business.

Silk Mill at Cape Vincent.
Inquiries have been made of village officials at Cape Vincent, N.Y., regarding buildings available for conversion to a silk factory. Two hundred operators will be required at the proposed plant. It is pointed out that the shipments of raw silk come through Canada. Deliveries by water at the port of Cape Vincent would be an economic advantage to the company.

Died in Ottawa.
Dr. E. B. Echlin, Ottawa, died on Friday, aged seventy-five years, after a short illness. In his younger days he was a noted football player and a brilliant member of Queen's University team. He continued his interest in sport after he was graduated from Queen's in 1891. Dr. Echlin graduated in arts in 1891. He had been in practice in Ottawa since 1894. Deceased was prominent in military and social circles.

Fingers Badly Crushed.
Fred War, son of G. S. War, Tweed, met with a very painful accident, while at work at the Steel Trough and Machine Co.'s plant. He was feeding sheet metal into the rolls and happened to get his fingers too far in with the result that they were crushed. He first felt his right fingers getting slipped but jerked them away and in his excitement

caught the left hand fingers, which were badly crushed. We hope he will not lose the use of them.

Ice Makers Are Happy.
The ice makers at the covered rink and curling rinks were delighted with the change in the weather as it will enable them to continue making ice. On Friday they had to discontinue work as the weather got so mild.

Mockery of Civil Service Reform.
The Toronto Globe says: The appointment of a member of Parliament to the wardenship of the penitentiary would be a mockery of civil service reform. The post should go to a man who has spent years in the service as a reward and promotion.

Bank Manager Transferred.
F. L. MacGachen, manager of the Merchants Bank of Canada, Collingwood, has been notified of his transfer to the office of the bank in Quebec city. He came to Collingwood from Orillia three years ago, and was the first manager of the bank in Collingwood. He is married to a daughter of the late Rev. F. W. Kirkpatrick of St. James' church.
