THE DIRECTORS MET.

Canadian Locomotive Company Increases Common Dividend. The Canadian Locomotive Company has increased the dividend on its common stock from six to seven per cent., placing it on the same annual basis as the preferred. The directors on Saturday announced a quarterly distribution of 1 1/2 per cent. on both securities, each of them payable Jan. 2nd to shareholders of record Dec. 29th.

The dividend on the share at the rate of six per cent. per annum was declared in 1918, in 1917 three per cent. having been paid. For several years prior to 1917 no dividend was paid on the common.

The company's profits during the past fiscal year were the highest on record, so that some increase in the common dividend had been anticipated by the Street. An increase to eight per cent. was spoken of in some quarters, but the recent strike no doubt influenced the directors to a more conservative course.

Purcell, is to be paroled this week. Long's conduct at the time of the accident when Guard Purcell was fatally injured, was highly commended, and the jury felt that such conduct ought to be recognized not only as a reward to the prisoner himself but also to encourage others.

14TH LIKELY TO REMAIN

AS KINGSTON'S UNIT IN THE CANADIAN MILITIA.

It would be re-organized on the Sixteen-Platoon System—Major-General Williams and Col. W. B. Brown in Ottawa. Major-General Williams, G.O.C., accompanied by Col. W. B. Brown, D.A.A. and Q.U.G., went to Ottawa on Saturday to attend a continuation of the conference on the re-organization of the militia.

Much valuable information was obtained by the board during the Friday session, but no information was given out, as the board is only authorized to make a report to the Militia Council. The general opinion seems to be, however, that there will be no wiping out of the old militia units and the substitution therefor of the C.E.F. units, because it is practically impossible to perpetuate the C.E.F. battalions owing to the manner in which they were organized and recruited. They were authorized independently of the militia regulations, and in many instances recruits were drawn from all over Canada, and before the end of the war had almost completely lost their identity with the district in which they were originally raised.

There is reason to believe that the 14th Regiment, P.W.C., will remain the Kingston city regiment, but will be re-organized on the sixteen-platoon system. This will please Kingston military men, for the old 14th certainly did its duty during the war by contributing men and money most generously to every C.E.F. unit that needed it, and formed a guard that was on duty from the commencement of the war until Nov. 10th, 1917. Nearly all of the officers served overseas, and fifty-two were trained for the C.E.F. after the war broke out.

Retiring Eight More Prison Officers

Disatisfaction Expressed Over Manner in Which Old Officers Are Let Go.

It is reported that eight more officials at the Portsmouth penitentiary are to be retired as being medically unfit at once. This action is said to be the result of recent physical examinations of the whole staff. There is much disatisfaction expressed over the preemptory manner in which these old officials, many of whom have served the institution all their lives, are being let out. One man, it is declared, was called from his work to the warden's office and told to go home.

Cases are reported where as much as three months leave have been given to particular individuals before being struck off; and at this season of the year it is felt that these old officials who are not even given a pension after their capacity to earn a living is gone, should not be subjected to hardship.

The six-year-old son of John Francis, miller, was smothered in wheat in the Maple Leaf Milling Co.'s mill at Dresden. The Washington American League Club has been sold to new interests and will not continue to operate in Washington. It is said that the Reds in Montreal hope to upset the government about the 1st of May and establish a Soviet government. The Ontario Commercial Travelers' Association branch in London collected by house-to-house calls \$22,800 for the Children's Aid Society; they aimed at \$20,000. Part of the second floor of the department store of the W. E. Preston, Ltd., in Midland, collapsed Saturday afternoon, causing injuries to a number of persons, mostly children.

According to the Liverpool Post, Premier Lloyd George and Clemenceau decided to internationalize Constantinople. This, says the Post, may serve as an inducement to America to join the entente in administering the region.
