## DIED IN TERRIBLE AGONY

**INSECT POWDER IN PACKAGES  
KILLED POOR FARM INMATES.**

Four Aged Men Died, Two Others  
Are Dying and Thirty-five Are  
Seriously Ill, as the Result of  
Cooke's Mistake in Mixing Batter.

Kalamazoo, Dec. 16.—Four aged  
inmates of Kalamazoo County poor  
farm died in terrible agony, two  
others are dying and thirty-five are  
seriously ill from the effects of an  
insect powder which had been acci-  
dentally mixed in packages prepared  
for supper at the institution. The  
dead are: Frank Lester, 61; De-  
Forest Davis, 73; Charles Francisco,  
50; and Edmund Briggs, 55.

A can of insect powder taken from  
the kitchen by one of the patients  
was accidentally placed on a shelf in  
the pantry among the cooking in-  
gredients. In mixing the batter for  
pancakes, Walter Baker, the cook,  
got hold of the can of poison instead  
of baking powder, and used the con-  
tents liberally in the mixture.

## HE MADE HIS SNEAK.

Belleville, Dec. 16.—W. Barringer,  
of Bancroft, was on Thursday before  
Police Magistrate Mason charged  
with selling liquor without a license.  
He was convicted and fined \$200 and

cure a couple of witnesses, but he  
evidently forgot to return, and up to  
the present is still missing. Now he  
has a second charge to face, that of

"Shop early! Shop early!" The
