**Fire Record for 1919.**  
Chief Armstrong submitted the following fire record to Dec. 15th: Loss on buildings, \$30,539.30; on contents, \$24,731.34; total insurance, \$1,108,450.  
Loss 1918, \$47,815.00; insurance, \$1,578,300.  
Alarms to December 15th, 1919, 128.  
Alarm record, 132 in 1913. Alarms 1918, 121.  
May 4th—Dan Gallivan killed and injured in fire.  
Sept. 3rd—George Gittas died from burns received when his patrol roaster caught fire and the gasoline tank exploded.  
October 29th—Miss McDermott received burns from a gas heater from which she died in hospital on Nov. 3.  
The chief remarked that there were more fires of a serious nature fought by the department this year than in any year since he assumed control, but none of the fires got beyond control.  
Chairman Chown stated that before the end of the year sixty-two new street lights would have been erected. The committee had done well in this regard.  
A resolution was passed on motion Aid. Simmons, authorizing the chief to look after all fire extinguishers in public buildings. The chief will see that they are re-charged free of cost. He remarked that the fire brigade was saved many runs by places having extinguishers which could take care of small fires which broke out. Merchants are to be encouraged to equip their premises with these extinguishers. Chief Armstrong's view is that a fire department's duty is just as much in helping the people to prevent fires as it is in fighting them.  
In replying to a vote of thanks moved by Aid. Anglin, Chairman Chown stated that a good deal of work had been performed by the committee this year, and it had kept within its appropriation. It was not its fault that the motorization of the department had not been decided upon, but he hoped that next year something definite might be done in this connection. The chief had stated that two fire teams have to be sold shortly as their usefulness was about gone, and it would cost \$1,000 to replace them.

**15 AIRPLANE REGIMENTS.**  
In the New French Army Being Organized.  
London, Dec. 17.—The important role played by aviators during the war is to be commemorated in the French army in times of peace. Whereas, no official air regiments existed in 1914, the re-organized army will have fifteen regiments using rapid planes and three bombardment regiments. Algeria and Morocco each will have one regiment of flyers. Pilots will be specially trained for service in these regiments, while volunteers with proved abilities to fly will be accepted.

**WON'T PREVENT FIREMEN FROM PERFORMING LITTLE DUTIES ON THE SIDE**  
Fire and Light Committee Voted Down Aid. Jones' Resolution to Prohibit Them Engaging in Decoration Work.  
At the meeting of the civic fire and light committee yesterday afternoon Aid. Jones raised an objection to the members of the fire brigade being engaged in decorating Princess street between Bagot and Wellington streets for the merchants of that block. He claimed that the firemen were the servants of the department for twenty-four hours a day, and that if any money was to be made in a job like that on Princess street, the men out of work should be given a chance. He moved that hereafter, firemen be not permitted to do any jobs outside fire department work.  
Ald. White opposed the resolution, claiming that firemen were only at the disposal of the department for twenty-four hours if there should be a fire when they were off duty. They were on duty twelve hours and were off twelve. He could see no reason for preventing a fireman doing work on a street to make it look more beautiful at the Christmas season.  
Ald. Anglin, Aid. Simmons and Chairman Chown disagreed with the view expressed by Aid. Jones.  
Chief Armstrong stated that if there was anything wrong about the firemen helping to decorate Princess street at the request of the merchants he desired to shoulder the blame for he had given the necessary permission to the men. For the past five years, the firemen had helped to do a lot of city decorating and had not
