BAWLIF IS KEPT VERY BUSY

INSTRUCTING THE VARIOUS QUEEN'S HOCKEY TEAMS.

Ottawa, Belleville and Trenton Want Games—The Kingston Junior Team Being Handled by "Jack" Powell.

Out-of-town hockey clubs evidently think that Queen's University has "some" hockey teams, as during the past few days "Nick" Bawlif has received no less than four requests for games. The Ottawa College team, which has been trimming everything in sight, and St. Patrick's of Ottawa, who have an all-star team, have written "Nick," asking him to arrange for games in Kingston. Queen's other teams are also in demand, as both Belleville and Trenton want university players to visit them. The matter is under consideration, and the management will either accept or reject these challenges in the course of a few days. The great difficulty that the management is up against is that many of the good players will be out of the city for the Christmas holidays.

On Friday Coach Bawlif had a very busy time at the rink trying to instruct the Queen's players in some of the fine points of the game. He went on the ice at four o'clock, and was with the different teams until eight o'clock. At Friday's practice, Walter Ellis was in uniform. On the two defences on Friday afternoon, Bawlif was trying out Ken Taylor in goal, Ferguson and Carroll on defence at one end, and Legault, Brownfield and Ellis at the other end. He kept changing the forward men. The great tendency shown by many players is to try and score from the centre position, whereas Bawlif insists that they pass out to the wings.

During the Christmas vacation the coach intends to have the teams on the ice for two hours at least each day.

Queen's Ladies Have Hockey Team.
Under the faithful training of "Nick" Bawlif, the young ladies of Queen's expect to have a real good hockey team this winter. This week a number of the girls turned out and showed the new coach that they knew a thing or two about the game. Although very few of the girls are good stick handlers, they are expert skaters, so their coach thinks that he can show them how to handle a stick. As soon as the girls return from their Christmas vacation they will get down to steady practice, and in the course of about two weeks they will be open to play out-of-town teams.

Kingston Juniors Practice.
Commencing at eight o'clock, the Kingston junior hockey team practiced at the covered rink on Friday night. Senator Powell was on the ice, and showed the juniors some of the points of the game. Don Robinson, who made such a fine showing with the Queen's juniors last winter, is out with them. In the course of a couple of weeks of hard practice, the team will be in good shape for the opening games.

Queen's Girls at Basketball.
Miss Clark, ladies' physical director at Queen's University, is spending considerable time training a ladies' basketball team, which will likely play some exciting games in the near future.
