Kingston and Vicinity

Grant to Kingston Hospital.
The Napanee council voted \$150 to the Kingston General Hospital.

J. C. Sutton, Colebrook, died on Monday last after a brief illness. He was superintendent of the Methodist Sunday school of that place for over twenty-five years.

The court of revision held a three-hour session on Saturday afternoon in the city council chamber to hear appeals against vacancies, etc. There were about twenty-five appeals in all considered.

Died Before Operation.
A son of Stanley, Ballance, Napanee, ill for several weeks, was brought to the Kingston General Hospital, but death came before the necessary operation could be performed.

Running at Full Capacity.
The United States fish hatchery at Cape Vincent is now running at its full capacity. The supply of eggs in process of hatching is larger than usual, consisting of white fish, lake trout and lake herring.

Receive a Masonic Dinner.
The old people in the Home for the Aged are most respectfully requested to attend the Masonic Lodge for a splendid dinner they will receive this evening. The lodge voted twenty-five dollars for the purpose.

Splendid Asset to Town.
The Hotel Renfrew, at Renfrew, is becoming increasingly popular with visitors every week, and rooms are often at a premium. This big citizens' hotel is a splendid asset to the town, and undoubtedly brings many people there.

Cannot Go Into Rectory.
Because of repairs and alterations to the Gananoque rectory, the new rector, Rev. Rural Dean Spencer, will not be able to take up his residence there for some months, but he will commence active work in the parish early in January.

Thirty-seven in Home.
At present there are only thirty-seven inmates in the Home for the Aged, twenty-two men and fifteen women. Forty-five is considered an average number, but it is noted that farmers are keeping a number of old people, who are very handy around a house doing chores.

A Modest Request.
The Mother Superior of the House of Providence most respectfully requests the citizens of Kingston to remember in their charity the above institution, so that the inmates under her care may not be deprived this year of the good things usually dispensed so abundantly on the happy feast of Christmas.

Unfortunate Accident in Box Factory.
John McGilivray, who suffered injuries in the Canada Box Board Company's factory, Frankford, on Wednesday, died in Belleville Hospital. The unfortunate man had been caught in the gearing and his right arm and shoulder were badly torn. He also suffered from the severe shock.

Said It Was No Good.
During the evidence in the assault case heard at the courthouse before Justice of the Peace J. W. Bradshaw, on Friday, one witness, when asked what the conversation was about shortly before the alleged assault was committed. He said that Arthur Kirkpatrick remarked that the Farmers' Government was no good. The witness in question advised Kirkpatrick to give it a chance.

Poisoned His System.
William H. Airth, son of Thomas Airth, Renfrew, died on Saturday. About ten days previous to his death a boil appeared on one of his fingers and was succeeded by two others on other parts, all of which came to a head. A fourth started on his upper lip, and not coming to a head the system was poisoned, and death ensued. He was at school three days before he died.

Opened G.W.V.A. Rooms.
The new club rooms of the Renfrew branch of the Great War Veterans' Association, located in the Fraser block and embracing the whole of the second floor, were opened on Friday with a social gathering composed of "veterans and their friends" to the number of about 300.

Consolidated School Formed.
It looks as though a consolidated school would be built in Wellington in the very near future. A few weeks ago the first public meeting to consider the consolidated school problem was held. A committee composed of representative men from the various school sections surrounding Wellington was appointed at this meeting.

Robbing Houses.
Complaint has been made to the police about two men who are playing a "take" game in the city in an endeavor to rob houses. One man sits on the doorstep and plays sick while the other talks to the lady of the house. After the two are allowed in the house, and the lady is telephoning for assistance, the men take the opportunity to commit robbery. It is stated that a number of houses in the west end of the city were rob-

bed during the past ten days in this manner.

In Military Circles.
There is a pretty reliable report that in the reorganization of the militia units all city corps infantry regiments will be formed on the double company basis.

On Friday night a rearrangement of the officers of the headquarters staff took place to make room for the militia units. Under the change effected, all of the officers are now located on the upper floor, and there is ample room for the machine gun company and the 14th Regiment, P. W. O. R.
