 work.

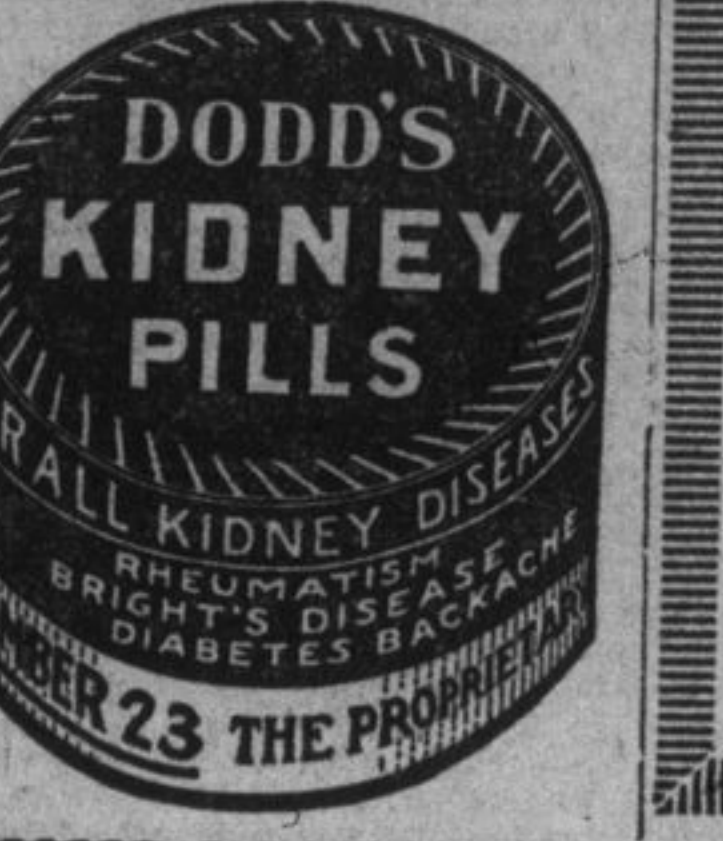
Sunday School Basketball
