Kingston Men Who Left Home To Gain Fame

HIS HONOUR JAMES REDMOND O'REILLY

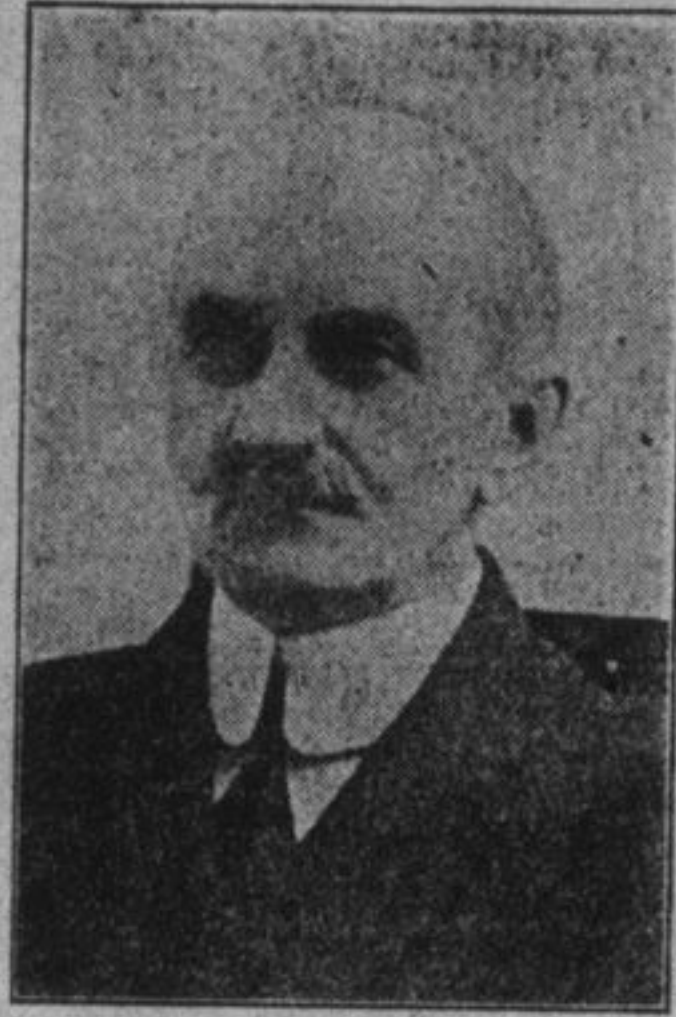
Judge of United Counties of Stormont, Glengarry and Dundas. Article No. 7.
 James Redmond O'Reilly, the County Court Judge of the United Counties of Stormont, Glengarry and Dundas, is a Kingstonsian who comes of a family of famous lawyers. His father was James O'Reilly, K.C., and was for a time member of parliament for the city of Kingston. His mother was Mary Jane Redmond. His parents settled in Kingston after their marriage, and lived in a house on Barrie Street owned by his father. This house afterwards passed into the hands of Miss Bridget Doran, and still stands on Barrie Street. In this house, on February 14th, 1862, the first child of James and Mary O'Reilly was born. So as to avoid any family conflict as

political life of that community, and was looked upon as the leader in that respect in Grenville county.

In 1899 his worth as a barrister was again recognized for in that year he was honoured by being appointed Queen's Counsel. A year later even greater things were in store for him, and he was appointed senior judge of the United Counties of Stormont, Glengarry and Dundas in March of that year. In the twenty years, more or less, during which he has occupied this position, he has always had the highest respect of the whole community. He is regarded as one of the most efficient and capable of judges. His long experience of legal work fitted him specially for the judiciary, and it can be said without fear of contradiction that he is indeed an asset to the Ontario Bench. He is still a comparatively young man, considering his position, and has many years of useful activity before him. As a native of Kingston, as a member of the legal profession and as a judge of the Ontario court, he has done well, and is indeed worthy of a place in the list of Kingstonsians who made good away from their own home town.

Still, although Judge O'Reilly pained his fame in other cities and towns, he had sufficient good sense to come back to the old Limestone City to find a wife. In December, 1898, he married Rose Mary Bermingham, fourth daughter of the late James Bermingham. Two children were born of that marriage, both sons, and these sons are now young men who have played a valiant part in the great war. The elder is Major James O'Reilly, M.C., and the other is Lieutenant William H. O'Reilly, and both of them served their empire overseas as their father has served it on the bench for nearly twenty years.

Judge O'Reilly now lives in Cornwall, where the judge's chambers for the United Counties are situated. He is a distinguished looking man, and is one of the most popular citizens of the district in which he lives. Kingstonsians bear him no grudge for having left this city, although he might have served Kingston equally as well as he has served the community of his adoption. His career is by no means at an end, for he is as yet only 57 years old. He is well known to many of the older residents of Kingston, and his future will be watched with interest by many friends in this city.

to name he was called James Redmond O'Reilly, and he is the subject of this biographical sketch.

The parents of James O'Reilly were Irish Catholics, and his education began at the old Regiopolis College in Kingston. After spending his earlier years there, he went to Montreal owing to a change of location of his parents, and continued his education at the St. Mary's Jesuit College, Montreal. All through the years of his education he gave promise of being a brilliant scholar, and these early promises were fulfilled in his career at Queen's University, which he entered in the fall of 1877, when only sixteen years and seven months. His progress through Queen's was phenomenal, and when he graduated with the degree of B. A. in 1882, he was prize man in Philosophy and gold medalist in Political Economy.

After this brilliant career as a scholar at Queen's he turned his eyes towards the law as his field of life work. Following his father's footsteps in this respect, he studied law and was admitted as a solicitor. Three years after his departure from the walls of good old Queen's, he was called to the Ontario Bar in 1885, and took up practice in Toronto. After a spell in Toronto he came east, and began to practice in Prescott, where his undoubted abilities soon gained for him recognition in the whole district surrounding that town. He became one of rural Eastern Ontario's leading barristers, and his worth was so well recognized by his colleagues that for thirteen years he occupied the position of President of the South Grenville Reform Association. He was a Pioneer Hardware Man of Oakland, California, Also an Inventor and a Manufacturer.

The Oakland Tribune contains the following notice of the death of J. Vickers Chown, the younger brother of the general superintendent of the Canadian Methodist church:

"J. Vickers Chown, promoter and pioneer California hardware man, died late yesterday at his home, 345 Hanover street, following an attack of apoplexy on Thanksgiving Day, from which he did not regain consciousness. Death came on his sixty-first birthday.

"Mr. Chown is known as the manufacturer of Chown firebrick and the inventor of an electric oven built on the same lines as the electric heating units in domestic appliances. Recently, he had been engaged in the development of a process for reducing iron ore without using coke, by means of which he hoped to develop millions of tons of iron pyrite ore in California.

"He was a native of Kingston, Ontario. Besides his widow, there are three sons, Sidney V., Norman and Phillip, and a daughter, Miss Marian Chown. A brother, Frank V. Chown, is a retired merchant of Portland, Oregon, and another brother, S. D. Chown, is general superintendent of the Methodist church of Canada."

NEW R.N.W.M.P. POST.

One Established at Copper Mine River on Arctic Coast. The Pas. Man., Dec. 26.—The Royal North-west Mounted Police have opened a post at the mouth of the Copper Mine River, on the Arctic Ocean, the most northerly and most isolated point in the jurisdiction of the force. Corporal J. A. Bruce will be in charge.

The establishment of this post was brought about by the report of Capt. French, who made the first exploration of the area covered between Chesterfield Inlet and the Arctic to Coronation Gulf.

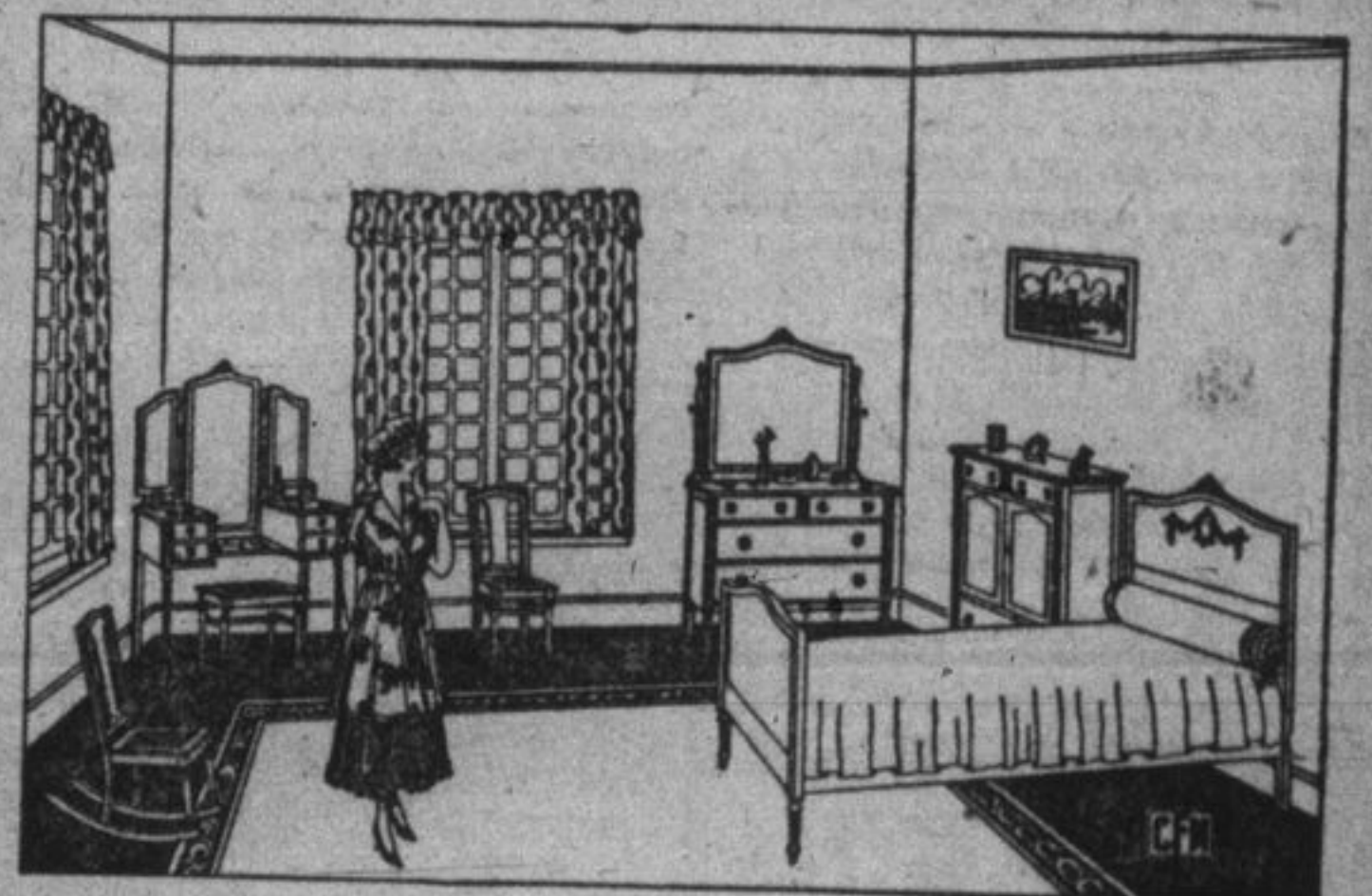
