It is the Skirt that Makes All the Difference When You Wear One of the New Lace Blouses.
All very well and good if you have the price—this new fad for the separate blouse of priceless lace; provided of course that you have an eye and a very wise eye to the skirt that you wear with it. There is the rub.
To be sure, that is always the danger of the separate blouse. And the danger is magnified when the gorgeousness of the blouse is increased. A very much talked about blouse of old point lace that is said to be priced at somewhere around thirty-five hundred dollars has been photographed till we are weary of seeing it. And one thing that makes you especially weary is to see this blouse or any other of its ilk worn with a hastily selected skirt. In one of these photographs the model apparently kept on her suit skirt. And the result was far from pleasing. For lace blouses or any others of the expensive or elaborate blouses that are now made to meet the Palm Beach demand are really not meant to be combined with the suit at all. They are meant to be worn with a skirt that is carefully and judiciously selected. If you must wear a wrap, a scarf or cape is what you should select. With the suit, you either content yourself with the gilet or waistcoat, or wear one of the simpler blouses, elaborate only at the neckline or in the front—for though the separate skirt and blouse are in vogue it does not follow that the well-dressed women wear these separate blouses with their suit skirt.
In the sketch you will see that the skirt selected to be worn with the blouse of ecru lace was made of black taffeta, which served to set off the design of the part of the blouse that appears below the waistline. And of course that matter of showing off the lace is an important one. Half the artistry of the lace makers is lost if you have the lace laid over a fabric of precisely the same hue. One might imagine that there might be some advantage in having the skin of an Ethiopian in wearing these white or ecru lace bodices and not feel that you were falling to show the intricacies of the lace. So the dilemma presents itself whether to give up being transparently bloused, or whether to give up a little of the effect of the lace. In the blouse of the sketch the lace is ecru which, over very white skin, of course would appear to good advantage.
In other blouses, however, silk slips are worn, sometimes even of satin, in a color vivid enough to do full credit to the lace. They at least have the appeal of novelty, for it is many years since we have worn anything more substantial under our blouses than a cambrile, and these slips are flush with the blouse at the neck and have sleeves that even extend below the lace sleeves.
And the belt or giraffe! That is always an important matter with these over blouses. They really should be worn with something metallic. With this blouse the giraffe is of large jet beads, and its tasseled ends are arranged so as to come somewhat to the left of the front.
