UNITED STATES AUTHORITIES WILL BE THOROUGH.

To Call in All Radicals For Examination and Possible Deportation-New York Heads List With 800

Arrests. Chicago, Jan. 5 .- Nation-wide raids on radicals have bagged 5,483 suspected reds in fifty-one cities, according to figures reported here. The raids may continue for two or three days, or until all of those marked for examination and possible deportation are caught, according to Federal of-

ficials here. New York, with 800 arrests, heads the list. Boston and Detroit have each reported six hundredbm bmm each reported 600; Chicago, 550, including a large number taken by state officials; 200 in New Hamp shire; 164 at Philadelphia; 100 each in Cleveland, Trenton, Youngstown,

Many Perfect Cases. Washington, Jan. 5.-Assistant Attorney-General Garvan, in charge of the raids, said more than 2,000 persons were held on "perfect cases." and that the raid promised to be not only the greatest in scope, but also the greatest in results of any in his-

In every city where the raiding mathinery was set in motion, he said success attended the efforts. Four thousand warrants were issued, but the arrests exceeded that number. Besides the 2,000 "perfect cases," Mr. Garvan said, federal agents obtained sufficient evidence to justify the arrests of the others.
