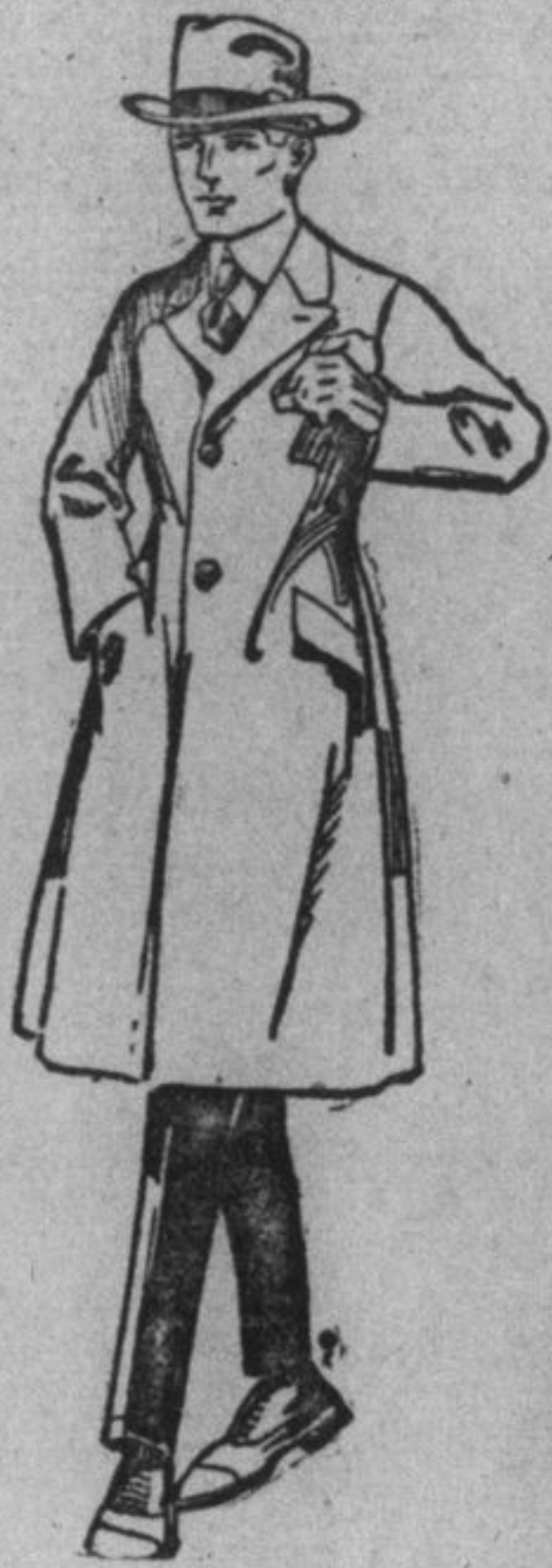

DEATH OF MRS. I. C. ALGIRE

WENT WEST FOR REST AND PASSED AWAY SUDDENLY.

Born in Mallorytown—Funeral is to be Held in Athens When Remains Arrive From British Columbia. Athens, Jan. 6.—On Saturday evening a message reached Athens conveying the sad intelligence of the death Saturday morning in the General Hospital, Vancouver, B.C., of one of Athens' highly respected residents in the person of Mrs. I. C. Algire.

On October 21st last Mrs. Algire left Athens for Ottawa, where her husband, Mr. A. F. Chapman, of that city, joined her, and the following day they left on a trip to Edmonton and Vancouver to visit friends. After spending about ten days in Edmonton with a sister and niece, they proceeded to Vancouver. Mrs. Chapman returned home the latter part of November, Mrs. Algire having planned to spend the winter in that city with her sister, Mrs. Buell and daughter, Mrs. Anderson.

Shortly after her arrival severe headaches developed, from which she suffered slightly. They gradually became more violent, and on December 17th she was taken to the hospital, after suddenly losing the sight of the left eye from hemorrhages, and the sight of the right eye was nearly gone. Specialists attributed the cause to a degeneration of the blood. Five teeth were extracted owing to abscesses.

Mrs. Algire was Laura Judd, the third daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Henry Judd, of Mallorytown, and she was born in that village on Aug. 28th, 1848. On June 19th, 1872, she was united in marriage to Isaac C. Algire and took up residence in Athens in the beautiful home, she since occupied on Elgin street. On March 3rd, 1915, Mr. Algire passed away and she was left alone with a niece of her husband, Miss Ella Deming, who had always resided in the home. For the past five years her mother, Mrs. Judd, who passed away last summer, lived with her, and Mrs. Algire feeling the need of a rest and change, planned to spend the winter in Vancouver with her sister and niece. She leaves a host of friends who sincerely regret her sudden death. She was a woman of warm sympathy and gracious manner, and her beautiful home was always a hospitable one.

She was a member of the Methodist church and took a deep interest in all branches of its work, being an ardent Sunday school worker and class leader and an officer in many of the church societies. Her memory will ever be cherished in the church and village.

Besides Miss Deming in the home, she leaves six sisters and one brother. They are: Mrs. V. Buell, Vancouver, B.C.; Mrs. A. F. Chapman, Ottawa; Mrs. F. Sheldon, Athens; Mrs. (Rev.) T. C. Buchanan, Edmonton, Alta.; Mrs. O. H. Bresse, Mrs. (Dr.) Sparling and Dr. D. H. Judd, all of Boston.

The remains left Vancouver Sunday morning and are expected to arrive in Athens about Friday. The funeral will be held from her late residence to the Methodist church.

OBITUARY

The Late Patrick Fannon.

The death occurred in the Hotel Dieu on Monday afternoon about 5.30 o'clock, when Patrick Fannon, who for years was coachman at the archbishop's palace, passed to rest. The cause of death was due to pneumonia.

The deceased, who was an expert horseman, served with the R.C.H.A. in the North-West rebellion. For years he was marshal of the Young Irishmen and used to ride at the head of the procession through the streets of Kingston. He is survived by his wife and family.
