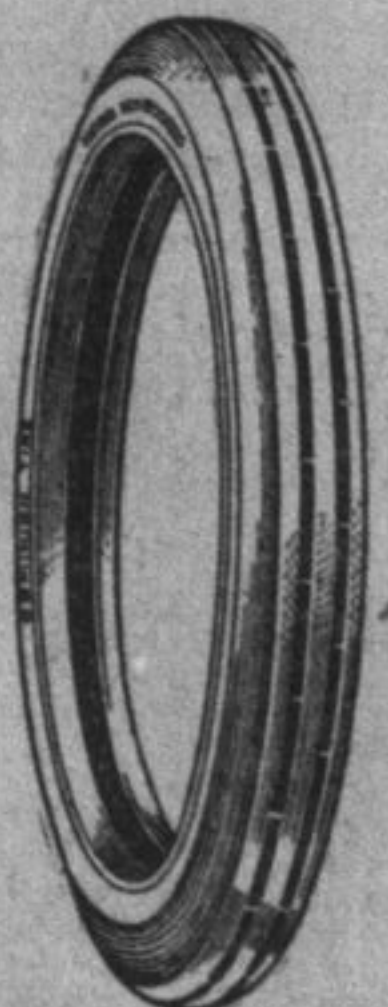

DR. S. G. BLAND'S PROTEST NEED OF CHURCH UNIVERSAL

WILL BE ECHOED IN THE HEARTS OF PREACHERS

SHOULD BE STRENGTHENED, SAYS J. S. LAFLAIR.

Over The Length and Breadth of the Land—Freedom of Thought and Freedom of Speech is Essential.

Rev. Dr. Bland made an appeal on Sunday, in his pulpit in Broad Street Methodist Tabernacle, which will be echoed in the hearts of preachers throughout the length and breadth of the land. His appeal was for freedom of thought and freedom of speech within the limits of his church's discipline. Dr. Bland has had to complain of the interference of officials of the church who view everything from personal standpoints, and who insist that the preacher is not to lead, but to be led. Preachers who are willing to be led by those who carry the bag are the bane of any church, and are accountable to a large extent for that failure of the church, in its mission, over which so many enquiries have been held in recent years.

Dr. Bland's appeal has the more weight since he was forced into a false position by the very men who have even been holding back his salary as a means of constraint. He was invited, without any seeking on his part, to come to the church, and he was assured of a free pulpit to present the truth as he saw it. In view of recent events, and the nature of the opposition to Dr. Bland, and quite independently of his views one way or another, public sympathy will be with him in his stand for principle.

"I stand," he declared, "for an honest pulpit, for a free pulpit. I believe the ministers of this city and of this continent are almost all behind the man who stands for a free pulpit. I will take the risks and consequences, whatever they be, for myself. I ask you: Will you not also stand for a free pulpit for an honest minister, and for a church that shows it is not controlled by money power? Various pretexts and excuses have been advanced to camouflage the real grounds of the dispute, but there can be no denial of the issue upon which Dr. Bland bases his protest. That issue is becoming less capable of disguise every year as men arise who refuse to prophesy smooth things.

At Second of Series of Special Meetings For Prayer in Brock Street Church—Church Weakened by Eyes Within and Without.

The second of the series of special meetings for prayer was held in Brock street Methodist church on Tuesday night. Rev. J. S. Laflair, pastor of the First Baptist church, was the speaker, and he delivered a forceful address on the subject, "The Church Universal." Rev. J. D. Ellis presided, and with him on the platform and assisting in the service were Rev. John Boyd, Rev. D. A. Lough and the speaker of the evening. During the meeting prayer was offered by G. A. Bateman, Mrs. Bateman, Mr. Kinch, Mr. McLaughlin, F. G. Lockett, Rev. W. T. G. Brown and Rev. J. A. Waddell.

Rev. Mr. Laflair devoted his address to one aspect of the church universal—that of the need of the church universal at the present time. One of the great needs of the church was the same as Paul had pointed out in his letter to the Ephesians. Paul asked that the church be strengthened. The church, the speaker pointed out, had been weakened by foes within and without.

He rejoiced in every movement set forth to help the work of the church, and referred especially to the great forward movement, and asked these questions: "Are we strengthening or weakening the church in this movement? Is there a danger that we will become so broad-minded, liberal and generous that we will give away so much that we will have nothing left? Was there a danger of tearing down the foundation-stone—the Christ? The church of to-day needs to be strengthened. And how is it to be strengthened? Paul says with might. The church of the 20th century needs to be strengthened by might with His spirit. The forward movement would not weaken the cause unless the holy spirit is in it. The day of opportunities and privileges was at hand for the church.

A BIG HOTEL IS TALKED OF

ONE PLANNED ON LA RUE ISLAND, NEAR WESTMINSTER PARK

On the Canadian Side—Said That It Will Bask in Sunshine of Canadian Excise Law.

A mammoth hotel of fireproof construction equipped with 1,000 rooms with bath will be reared on LaRue Island at a point just opposite Westminster Park, according to a report that reached Watertown, N.Y., to-day. While the names of the promoters are not announced, it is admitted that a combination of Canadian and American capital will finance the project.

It is significant to note that the magnificent structure will rear itself upon Canadian soil just across the border line on what is recognized as one of the natural beauty spots of the Thousand Islands. The guests of the hotel will bask in the sunshine of a liberal Canadian excise law which does not restrain the private possession of liquor either at home or on a fishing trip within its borders. While hotels are not permitted to sell liquor, there is no law that will restrain guests from having it in their rooms or drinking it with their meals. This fact is understood to be one of the potent forces that have induced the capitalists into their decision to make the big financial investment.

As far as can be learned here it is proposed to hasten the construction of the hotel and the development of the grounds which will surround it. Those who own cottages and hotels in that immediate neighborhood have heard of the proposition with delight, because of the great popularity it will give that section of the resort.

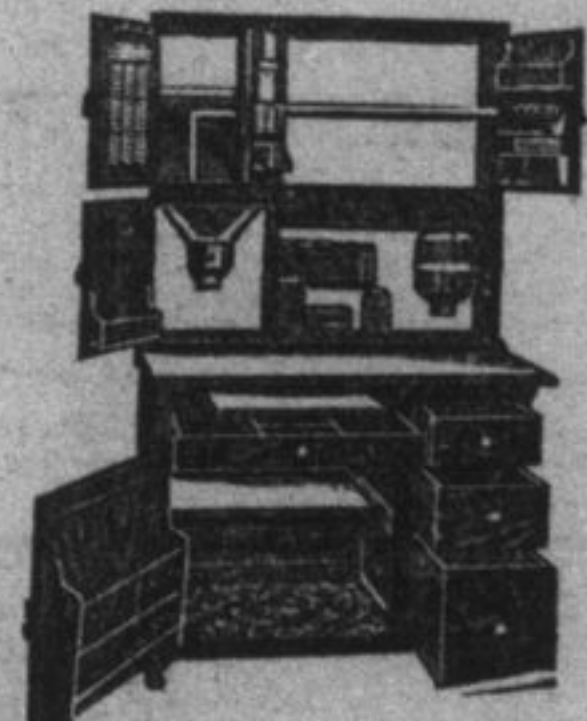
