1919 was less by \$10,157,900 than the 1918 output, according to the statement issued tonight by the bureau of the mint. In 1919 there were 2,829,395 fine ounces of gold, valued at \$58,488,800, produced in the

California led in gold production with 840,758 ounces, Colorado was next with 470,998 ounces, and Alaska third with 437,131.

Silver production in 1919 amounted to 55,285,196 ounces, valued at \$61,966,412, representing a reduc-tion of 12,524,943 ounces compared with the 1918 output. Montana led with 14,940,527 ounces. Utah second with 11,906,152, and Nevada third with 7,312,454.
