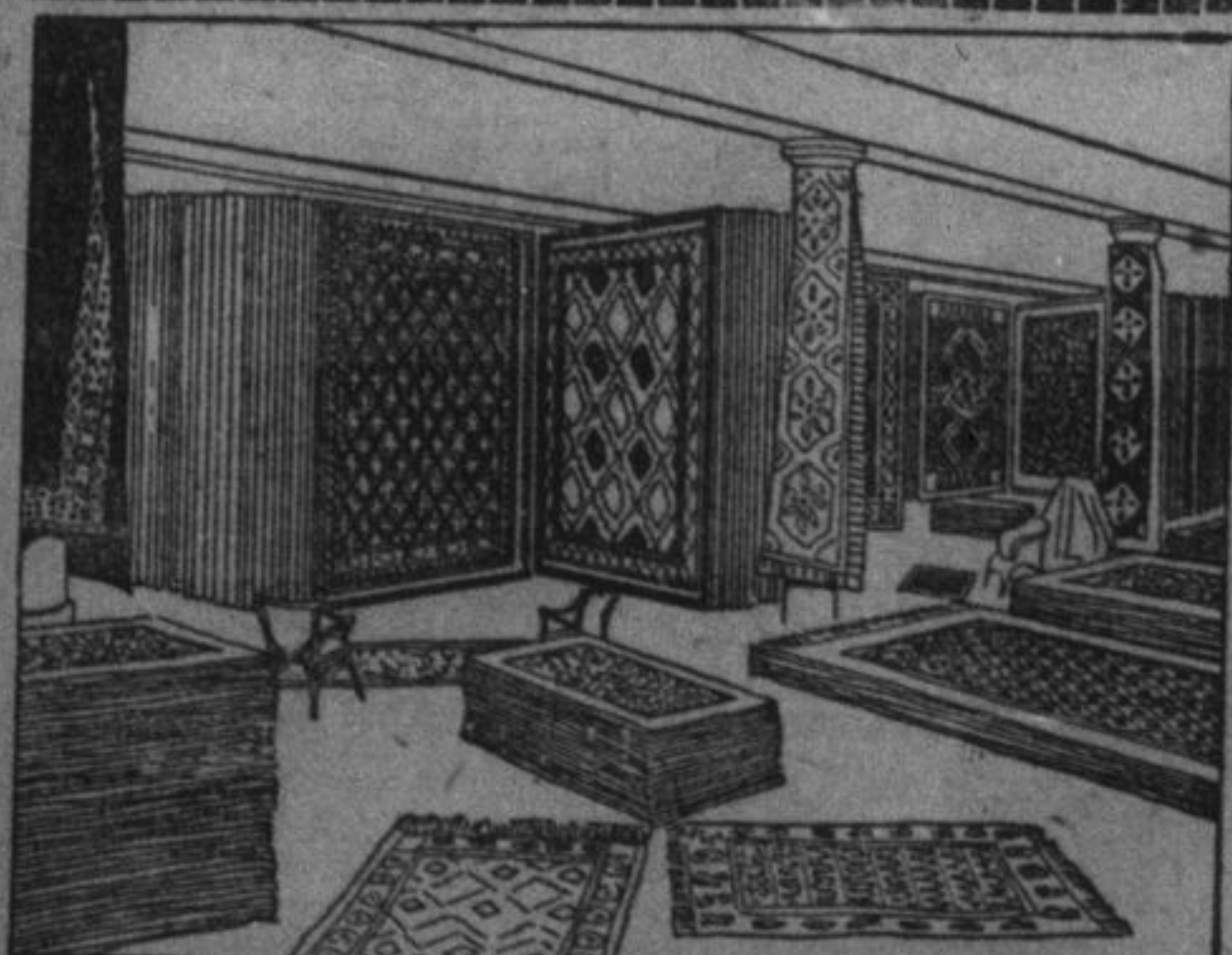

Miss Foster will sail for her home in Ireland, and will be married, and will then leave for her future home in East Africa.

It is with deep regret that Miss Foster is leaving Kingston, as she has done a wonderful work since coming to this city from New York three years ago. Her labors were not only among the girls of the Y. W. C. A., but also among the soldiers in the military hospitals and the prisoners in the penitentiary, to whom she sang. Miss Foster is one of St. Andrew's Presbyterian church soloists.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

A Matter of History. Kingston, Jan. 7.—(The Editor): In your paper of Saturday, Jan. 3rd, under "Dominion Happenings of Other Days," you state that the Duke of Richmond, then governor of Canada, died at Richmond, Que., from the bite of a pet fox.

I think you are mistaken, or I have been greatly misinformed. My parents have frequently pointed out to me the old barn and told me the story of the duke going mad, "likely hydrophobia," and being locked up in the barn until he died. This was in the late 18th century, or thereabouts. About Richmond was stationed after the war of 1812 the famous 103rd Regiment of the Dublin Fusiliers, of which my grandfather was sergeant in No. 7 Company. This regiment, on landing in Canada, became known as the 100th Regiment and fought all through the war.

Richmond, Carleton county, was settled and the surrounding country surveyed for the purpose of giving the soldiers land grants. A sergeant's grant was 200 acres. The papers were placed in a bag and each man put in his hand and drew out the number of his grant. My grandfather drew 100 acres on the 4th concession of Goughbourn, four miles from Richmond, and the other 100 acres five miles west of that, near Ashton. The papers were not delivered until 1817. The town was called Richmond West, to distinguish it from Richmond, in Lower Canada.

STATE OF SIEGE IS PROCLAIMED

Many Arrests Made in Consequence of Recent Outrages.

(Canadian Press Despatch) Madrid, Jan. 8.—Announcement was made late last night that a state of siege had been proclaimed throughout the province of Catalonia. The Minister of Interior declared, at midnight, that Barcelona was calm, and confirmed the reports that more than 300 arrests have been made in consequence of recent outrages. The leaders of the Syndicalists there had disappeared, he said. The minister added that the Government intended to take strong measures to put an end to the present state of affairs, the first step being to order the termination of the lockout declared in Barcelona, which, he stated, was keeping one hundred thousand persons out of employment.

BELLE OF THE BOLSHIES.

"Starlight-Sylph of the Soviets" is Sent to Ellis Island. New York, Jan. 8.—Miss Anna Manson, twenty-four years old, known as "Starlight Sylph of the Soviets," and declared the "most beautiful Bolshovist," was sent to Ellis Island yesterday to await deportation as an alien agitator. She was arrested in the raid last night on the Russian language radical paper Novy Mir. So eloquent was a speech made by the "Beautiful Bolshovist" at a police station, where she expounded the doctrines of free thought, free speech, equal distribution of all wealth, and free love, that her captors missed the regular ferry to Ellis Island, and she was escorted there individually by one of the police departments' most courtly detectives.

Election Decided By Coin.

Cobalt, Ont., Jan. 8.—By the flip of a coin, Malcolm Campbell will sit in the Cobalt town council this year. He and John Ough, who were tied for sixth place on the board after the votes were counted Monday night, tossed for the honors, Mr. Campbell winning. Town Clerk Ogorman, as returning officer, confirmed the decision.
