MAJOR-GEN. TWINING DEAD

WELL-KNOWN CANADIAN OFFICER PASSES AWAY IN LONDON.

Graduate and Professor in Royal Military College—Latterly He Was Director of Fortifications at British War Office.

The death of Major-Gen. Sir Phillip Geoffrey Twining, director of fortifications and works at the British War Office, is reported in a cable. His death occurred in London, England, on Thursday. The deceased was born in Halifax, N.S., fifty-seven years ago, and graduated at the Royal Military College, Kingston, in 1883. He served in the great war as quartermaster-general of the first Canadian army under General Horne, beginning as brigadier, and attaining the rank of major-general. He was knighted in recognition of his services. At the close of the war he was called to an imperial post at the War Office.

Major-Gen. Sir A. C. Macdonell, commandant of the Royal Military College, expressed keen regret when informed of the death of Major-Gen. Twining. He said that he himself was a recruit at the college in 1883, when Major-Gen. Twining was a senior, and took part with him in the college sports. He was most popular. Referring to his service in the late war, Major-Gen. Macdonell stated that he was extraordinarily efficient as quartermaster-general to the first army, and merited the distinction of knighthood conferred upon him by His Majesty. He was a visitor in Kingston in October last, and called upon him at the college, where he delivered a very fine address to the gentlemen cadets.

Upon his graduation from the R. M. C. he was granted a commission in the imperial army, and served in the Royal Engineers in India. He was mentioned in despatches in the South African war, and ultimately became commandant of the 1st King's Own, Sappers and Miners, Roorkee, India. Prior to that he was professor of military engineering in the Royal Military College here.

Gen. Twining is well remembered in Kingston for his popularity in social circles. He took a keen interest in the amateur dramatic clubs, and was prominent in "Snowball" and "The Passing Regiment," which were put on at the Grand Opera House and in the Victoria Theatre. He married Miss Louise Daly, of Nanawee, who survives.

BOY DENIES THEFT; SENT TO HIS HOME

This Fourteen-year-old Lad Belongs to the City of Toronto.

A fourteen-year-old boy, who was arrested several days ago, in connection with a charge of theft preferred by D. C. Curtis, a returned soldier, was before Magistrate Farrell, at a session of the juvenile court, on Friday morning, and it was decided to have him returned to his home in Toronto. It appears that he has been in Kingston for three weeks and that his parents did not know of his whereabouts.

The boy strongly denied having had a hand in the theft complained of by Curtis. It will be recalled that the accused was arrested with two young men, all three being charged with theft. One of the young fellows pleaded guilty to stealing eighty-five cents from the war veteran and the other was discharged.

RELAXATION IN SOME RULES

Postponement in Others Regarding Teachers' Qualifications.
Notice is being sent out by the Department of Education regarding the qualification of teachers. Regarding High School teachers there is some relaxation in the rules, and the announcement is:
"Section 1 of the amendments to the regulations of 1918 is hereby amended to provide that, notwithstanding anything to the contrary in said regulations, a High school assistant's certificate, interim or permanent, regularly issued under the present or any former regulations of this department, shall qualify the holder for the position as assistant in any High school, collegiate institute or Grade A continuation school."
The second change is a postponing of certain regulations regarding Public schools. The change reads: "Section 24 of the amendments to the regulations of 1918 is hereby amended by the substitution of the year 1924 for the year 1920," and "Section 25 (1) a and b, of the amendments to the regulations of 1918 are both amended by the substitution of the year 1924 for the year 1920."

Civic Committees.
The civic health committee met Thursday afternoon, with Ald. Stroud (chairman), Cohen and O'Connor in attendance. The committee intends following up the good work done by past committees in regard to garbage collection and disposal. Tenders were ordered to be called for wood supply. Ald. Cohen suggested purchasing presses for collecting much of the paper that is collected and disposing of the same. The committee will consider this suggestion.

The civic finance committee met Thursday evening, with Mayor Nickle presiding. It was decided that salary increases should not be made until the budget is struck.
