NEW THEOLOGY PROFESSOR

SECURED FOR QUEEN'S BY PRINCIPAL S. W. DYDE.

Rev. Joseph F. McFadyen, a Noted Scottish Theologian, Leaves Hislop College, Nagpur, India, to Accept Kingston Post.

Rev. Principal Joseph F. McFadyen, M.A., of Hislop College, Nagpur, India, has accepted the chair of New Testament Literature and Exegesis in Queen's Theological College, succeeding Dr. E. F. Scott, now at Union Theological Seminary, New York. Professor McFadyen is a brother of Professor John E. McFadyen of the United Free Church College, Glasgow, Scotland, and who formerly was on the staff of Knox College, Toronto. Queen's regards itself as fortunate in securing as successor to Dr. Scott such an eminent theologian as Principal McFadyen. The latter will not come to Kingston until next fall when he will be installed. It was due to a trip made to Scotland last summer by Principal S. W. Dyde that Principal McFadyen was secured.

Rev. Joseph F. McFadyen, after a distinguished career at the University of Glasgow, from which he graduated with first-class honors in classics, and at the Free Church College, Glasgow, was appointed in 1898 professor of economics at Hislop College, Nagpur, India. Last year he published a volume on "Jesus and Life" which has attracted wide attention and is now in its third edition, a rare experience for a theological book. He now holds the Sir Robert Bruce lectureship in New Testament Literature at the Glasgow United Free Church College.

Tributes are paid to the great intellectual competence of Principal McFadyen by leaders in the Scottish Presbyterian Church. India feels that it is losing a teacher whose place cannot be filled, for the theologian who is to come to Queen's possesses qualities most valuable for the training of students, including the qualities of mature wisdom and tact.

TO SPEAK AT QUEEN'S.
With Regard to India—Addresses by K. J. Saunders.
Kenneth J. Saunders is to address the Alma Mater Society at the university on Saturday evening on "The New India." In view of the recent action of the British parliament in extending a considerable degree of self-government to India, there is no part of the world which promises more interesting political and social developments than this thickly-populated part of the Empire. Kingston and the university are fortunate in having an opportunity of learning something of present conditions in India from one who, through his long experience there, his close study of its literature and religions and his intimate contact with its great work during the war, is so eminently fitted to speak as Mr. Saunders. Born in South Africa, educated in England, having spent most of his life since graduation in India, he is now paying a brief visit to Canada.

Mr. Saunders is to speak on Sunday afternoon as well as Saturday evening—his subject at the university service being "India's Gift to the World."

A COW SAVED THE COLONY

FROM TRAGIC DEATH ON LONE BELLE ISLE.

Milk and Bread Only Rations at Lighthouse for a Month and Half—Kill Cow When Hay and Grain Finished.

Quebec, Jan. 17.—The lighthouse-keeper's cow saved the Belle Isle colony from starvation while it waited relief from the outside world at the lonely island off the Labrador coast. As long as there was food for her the cow supplied milk, which, with bread, provided the complete menu of the colony for a month and a half. When the cow feed was finished the cow was killed and the beef and bones kept the colony alive until the ship Seal rescued the members of the colony.

"We lived one month and a half on bread and milk, and if help had come some weeks later they would have found the entire colony dead from hunger," said Raoul Bergeron, Quebec to-day with his wife and two children, and William George Wyatt, who was with him at East Point, Belle Isle.

The colony, he said, had been without supplies since last November, when the supply ships failed to reach them because of the ice and storms. Chances of hunting and shooting wild game were lost because of continued storms, and the colony faced starvation against the slim hope that a ship would get through to them.

Forty barrels of fish which in an emergency might have saved the colony through the winter were washed into the sea by the storms and lost. The gales were the worst in fifty years, and part of the concrete landing station that had been built by the Government at the island was washed away.
