**AN INSTALLATION SERVICE HELD IN COOKE'S CHURCH BY YOUNG PEOPLE'S SOCIETY**

Professor J. S. Watts Preached — The Installation Ceremony Was Performed by the Rev. W. Taylor Dale.

Professor J. S. Watts, of Queen's University, preached a most appropriate and thoughtful sermon in Cooke's Church on Sunday evening, when the installation of the officers of the Young People's Society took place. The subject he chose was "God's deliberate focussing of the truths of eternal life in Jesus Christ, and his narrowing down of the whole fundamental idea of himself in Christ. Jesus himself chose to narrow the limits of His life. In spite of temptations, to accept worldly riches and power, he pursued unwaveringly his narrow way to the cross. The choices of Christ were made so as to enable Him to be a real helper and sympathetic friend to suffering humanity. By doing so he limited His days to activity, but ensured that His work would live forever.

Men must also limit themselves to the service of the world, and not strive solely in the wake of their ambitions. Men must give up the bigger things of the outside world and concentrate on the one real thing, the secret of eternal love and eternal truth. Men and women in the past have placed this voluntary limitation on their lives, which is the essence of Christian service. The young people of the church should place themselves behind their ministers and work unheralded, for things worth while. It is no sacrifice to give up other things to do church work, but is only using an opportunity for eternal service to Christ, and the sacrifice is swallowed up in the joy of service. Amusements, recreation and family duties should be placed in their right proportion to the things of eternal life, and service given frankly, and freely. The Forward Movement should not only be forward, but should go deep down into the roots of life. If that were done, the giving for the church and for the raising of living standards would take its proper place as far more important than the entrance fee to a hockey match. Consecration to Christ alone will bring a proper sense of the service that should be given to the world and to the neighborhood in which men live.

After the sermon, the officers of the Young People's Society were installed by Rev. W. Taylor Dale, who congratulated the retiring officers on their efficient work, and addressed the new officers regarding the honor and responsibility of their positions. The officers installed were: President, R. M. Douglas; Vice-President, Kenneth Keill; 1st Vice-President, Miss Houghton; 2nd Vice-President, Mr. Wallace; Secretary, C. G. Harford; Treasurer, Miss A. **GOVERNMENT URGED TO GRANT BOUNTY TO SHIPBUILDERS**

Lack of Contracts Would Result in Forcing Out Trained Workmen.

The granting of a bounty to shipbuilding in Canada was urged on the government by a delegation representing returned men employed in shipyards throughout Canada. If the bounty were absolutely necessary to retain the shipbuilding business in Canada, the delegation urged, "we thoroughly endorse the project."

A memorandum on the subject, submitted by the delegation, continues: "In the event of this bounty being granted, and the work continued, each company will appoint a returned man, at its own expense, to safeguard the interests of the returned men. The companies further agree that at least 25 per cent. of the entire working force in each yard will consist of returned men, if such men are available."

"Some of the yards are not running at full capacity, this being due to the lack of contracts. Should no contracts be available, through outside competition, in all probability, these yards must close down permanently, thus forcing us to seek new lines, and to charge our vocation, which under the present industrial conditions, would be a manifest hardship to many of the men affected."

"Another phase of this end of the subject is that many now employed in this work have based their whole future practically upon the assumption that it would be a permanent vocation for them, and they have protected themselves by taking courses in vocational training best suited for this work, with this idea in view."

"This is one of the most important factors in connection with the future of this industry in this country, and has a very vital bearing upon the employment question, affecting a large percentage of returned men. This question also affects a great many employed in allied industries so that the entire matter is very far-reaching in its scope."

"At this time," the memorandum concludes, "when every effort is being bent towards a greater production of Canadian goods by Canadians it would seem expedient to encourage a business that promises to contribute so materially to the industrial welfare and commercial prosperity for which all true Canadians are striving."

The Government promised full consideration of the delegation's views.

The shipbuilding companies are asking for a bounty, payable for a period of ten years, of ten dollars and ten cents per indicated horsepower on steel ships built in Canada.

**YOUTH FURTHER REMANDED**

WILL MAKE RESTITUTION IN CASE OF BOGUS CHEQUES

Charge Against Proprietor of Pool Room Dismissed—Youth Looked To Be Eighteen, and Told Proprietor So.

J. D. Black, the youth, who was arrested a week ago, at Gananoque, charged with passing bogus cheques in Kingston, came before Magistrate Farrell, again on Monday morning. He has pleaded guilty and was further remanded. It is understood that restitution is being made.

The charge against James Ferguson, for allowing a boy in his pool room, who was under eighteen years of age was dismissed. The boy in question, according to the evidence given by his mother, will be 17 years of age on February 17th next. The young man in charge of the pool room, stated that he took the youth to be eighteen, and when he asked him his age, was informed that he was eighteen years old. Mr. Ferguson also stated that he had questioned the youth about his age and he claimed he was eighteen.

The case of Samuel Norris, charged with non support was up again. Sam was not present, and it was stated that he had gone into hospital for treatment, thus another enlargement of the case was found necessary.
