Cecil LeRoy Boyd, 5th Bri-gade, Canadian Trench Mortars, is given: "Lieut, Cecil LeRoy Boyd, 5th Brigade, Canadian Trench Mortars, particularly distinguished himself at Inchy, the 27th of September, 1918. In the course of the attack at the Canal du Nord and of the operations which led to the taking of Cambrai, as commander of the Divisional Trench Mortars, executed, in broad daylight, beneath a violent enemy fire, a bold reconnaissence which permitted him to find a place in the front line for his guns."
