PROVINCIAL COUNTY ROADS

In Frontenac are Described by Deputy Minister McLean.

The county clerk has received from W. A. McLean, deputy minister of highways for Ontario, a certificate in accordance with the request of the county council to designate the provincial county roads Nos. 97 and 98.

Road No. 97 is as follows: County road No. 4 from Cataract north to its junction with county road No. 5, known as the Portland road, thence county road No. 5 northerly and westerly to the junction with the county road No. 5 at a point known as Shibley's corner; thence county road No. 5 to the village of Harrowsmith; thence county road No. 12 through the village of Hartington to its junction with the county road No. 5 on the line between concessions VII and VIII in the township of Portland; thence county road No. 5 through the village of Verona to the northerly terminus of the said county road No. 5; being the boundary line between the township of Portland and Hinchinbrook.

Road No. 98: County road No. 6, known as the Kingston and Perth road, from the limits of the city of Kingston, northerly through the townships of Kingston, Strorington and Loughborough, to a point known as Buck Lake, adjacent to the boundary line of Loughborough and Bedford.

DISTINGUISHED HIMSELF.

How Lieut. Cecil LeRoy Boyd Won Croix de Guerre.

In a recent issue of the Gazette the following brief explanation of the award of the Croix de Guerre to Lieut. Cecil LeRoy Boyd, 5th Brigade, Canadian Trench Mortars, is given:

"Lieut. Cecil LeRoy Boyd, 5th Brigade, Canadian Trench Mortars, particularly distinguished himself at Vimy, the 27th of September, 1918. In the course of the attack at the Canal du Nord and of the operations which led to the taking of Cambrai, as commander of the Divisional Trench Mortars, he was present in the daylight, beneath a violent enemy fire, a bold reconnaissance which permitted him to find a place in the front line for his guns."

Lieut. Boyd here referred to is Capt. Boyd, a graduate of Queen's University and a graduate of law in Regina, Sask. He is a son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Havelock Price, Sydenham street, this city, having married Alma Price, another of Queen's distinguished graduates. Capt. and Mrs. Boyd now reside in Regina, where Capt. Boyd is practicing law.


