#### A STEADY MIGRATION

Rents in Japan Doubled in a Single Operation.  
 The steady migration of population to the cities from the interior, which had been going on in Japan prior to the outbreak of hostilities, was visibly accentuated by the war boom in business and industrial circles. A most noteworthy effect of the rapid growth of population in the cities has been the scarcity of dwelling houses in all the large cities, according to the Japan Advertiser. In many instances the rent has been doubled during the last twelve months and when the landlords no longer find an excuse to further raise the rent the property is ostensibly sold to another party so that the rent may be raised in the name of the new owner. There have been many individual cases of litigation arising out of disputes between landlords and tenants, but so far there has not been any test case on an important scale.

It is now reported that at Sumiyoshi, near Kobe, the owner of 80 houses recently notified his tenants, including many lawyers, judges and procurators, of an increase of the rents by 50 per cent., with the alternative of moving within five days if they did not agree to the proposition. The attitude of the house owner has greatly incensed the tenants, who have agreed among themselves to turn down the proposition of their landlord, and it is likely that the matter will be fought in the law courts. In Tokyo an association has been formed by some lawyers for the protection of the rights of tenants.

#### SUCCESSFULLY USED

Hairpins Are Now Used in Emergency Surgery.

Dr. Arnold K. Henry, of Dublin, who was a surgeon with the British expeditionary forces in France, several instances of using a hairpin when called upon to perform an operation without the proper tools.

In one case he horrified the mother superior of a French convent by using a common hairpin bent, as a retractor for an eyelid. In another he extracted with it a foreign body from the ear, which syringing had failed to remove.

Once when he had to perform tracheotomy on a baby, with no instrument but a knife, he borrowed a hairpin, bent it, inserted it into the wound in the throat and utilized the projecting ends as attachments for tape around the neck.
