THE SYNOD EXECUTIVE LADIES' CURLING PROGRAM

MET ON MONDAY TO PREPARE ITS ANNUAL REPORT.

Early Session of Synod to Launch the Anglican Forward Movement—Ontario Diocese Asked For \$96,000.

The annual meeting of the executive committee of the Diocese of Ontario was held in St. George's Hall on Monday morning at 10.30 o'clock. Bishop Bidwell presided, and also present were Dean Starr, the Archdeacons of Kingston and Ontario, Rev. J. H. Coleman, Canon Bedford-Jones, Canon Armstrongs, Rural Deans Crisp, Smith, Swayne, Revs. John Lyons, R. W. Spencer, also the chancellor, Judge McDonald, R. J. Carson, Francis King, J. B. Walkem, W. B. Carroll, J. H. Dawson, John Elliott, G. F. Ruttan, O. H. Scott, R. G. Wright, W. B. Dalton, Dr. Jackson and the secretary, Rev. J. W. Jones.

Letters of regret at being unable to be present at the meeting were received from Judge Reynolds and Rev. R. D. French.

An application for the sale of land from Delta, the proceeds to be used in the erection of a chapel for that church, was granted.

Rev. R. S. Forneri and Rev. C. J. Young had their superannuation allowance increased to \$300 per year.

The financial statement showed the funds of the diocese to be in a very satisfactory condition. The sum of \$13,300 for general missions has been received for the year, and the full apportionment to the north-west and foreign field, amounting to \$8,300 was paid. All the missions in the diocese have been occupied, and the salary of every missionary has been increased.

A bonus of \$25 was granted to the annuitants of the widows and orphans' fund last year, and a notice of an amendment to the canon was given to increase the annuity for this year.

The missionary clergy were granted a bonus of \$50 each to augment their salary for last year.

The bishop's travelling expenses were increased to \$500 per annum.

The names of Rev. J. H. Coleman and Major the Rev. Cregean were added to the annuitants of the clergy trust fund.

The sum of \$8,200 was voted to diocesan missions for 1920, and it is hoped that \$10,000 will be placed for the M.S.C.C.

Bishop Bidwell expressed his personal appreciation of the work done by Canon Bedford-Jones, who has been appointed principal of Lennoxville University. The bishop expressed his regret that he would be leaving the diocese to take up that work.

Eloquent tributes were also paid by other members of the committee.

A new assessment of parishes was advised, and a report will be submitted by the finance committee to the Synod.

A net dividend of 5% per cent. on its trust funds for the year 1919 was paid.

Bishop Bidwell intimated that Synod had been summoned for Jan. 28th, and that instead of the ordinary service, he would deliver his charge at the synod service in St. George's Cathedral on the evening of Jan. 28th.

His Lordship pointed out that it had been deemed necessary to have an early session of the synod, so as to successfully launch the Anglican Forward Movement. He rejoiced that the most of the parishes had taken up the matter enthusiastically. He hoped that the objective, \$96,000, will be reached next month.
