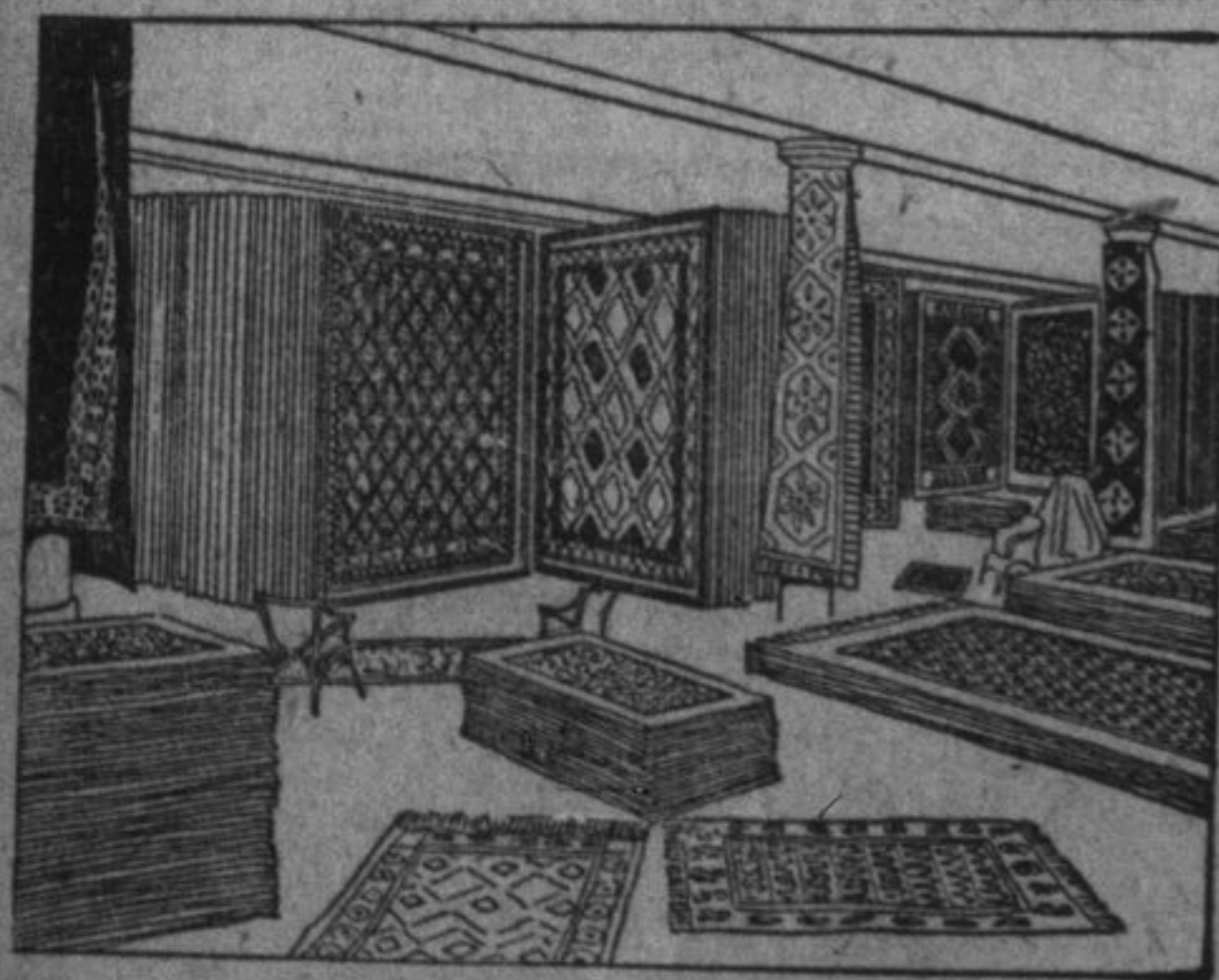

ARMY OF WORKMEN OVERHAULING LINERS

Imperator, Olympic and Aquitania to Be Soon Ready For Ocean Service.

London, Jan. 23.—An army of workmen is engaged in overhauling the three great trans-Atlantic liners, Imperator, Aquitania and Olympic, to place them back in the service at the earliest possible moment to meet the heavy demands of transportation to and from America.

MARRIAGE BANNED IN AUSTRIAN ARMY

Both Officers and Soldiers Must Also Waive All Political Rights.

Vienna, Jan. 23.—Soldiers and officers in the Austrian army are forbidden to marry and must waive their political rights under the provisions of the army bill now before the National Assembly.

PROSPECTS BRIGHT FOR AN AGREEMENT

Leaders Make Material Progress Towards Breaking Deadlock.

Washington, Jan. 23.—Marked improvement in possibility of composing the senate deadlock over the peace treaty was reported by leaders participating in the bi-partisan compromise negotiations.

The controversy between the Saskatchewan and Federal Government relative to the reimbursement of the former of over \$500,000 paid out as interest to bond holders under provincial guarantees of the Grand Trunk Pacific branch lines in that province, has been terminated and the matter settled.

Six officers and forty-eight men of the Russian forces were held by an American detachment following an unprovoked attack by Semionoff's band.

Ten million gallons of water are being wasted daily in Montreal, it is said.

GIRL HELD MAY BE JEANNE DEKAY

Woman Arrested in Aviator's Uniform Looks Like Miss-ling Heiress.

Atlanta, Ga., Jan. 23.—Dressed in the masculine uniform of an aviator, a young woman was being held at police station while frankly puzzled police sought to determine whether she is Jeanne Anna de Kay, missing protegee of Jane Addams of Hull House, Chicago.

The girl, in appearance, corresponds to press descriptions of Miss de Kay, except that her hair is bobbed and the word 'Heien' is tattooed on her arm. Under questioning police she first declared she 'knew' Miss de Kay, and then said she was Miss de Kay, but later denied it.

Next day she was arrested again and a blank charge of 'disorderly conduct' was docketed against her as the result of appearing in the lobby of a downtown hotel in men's attire.

The police started to investigate whether she was Miss de Kay and communicated with Chicago authorities. The young woman will be held pending definite determination of her identity.

TELLS OF 'INVISIBLE EMPIRE.'

Country Will Know 'Agent and Co-conspirator.'

Albany, N.Y., Jan. 23.—Martin W. Littleton, counsel for the assembly judiciary committee in the trial of the five suspended Socialist assemblymen, denounced the Socialist party 'as the agent and co-conspirator of an invisible empire whose object is the forcible overthrow of constitutional liberty in America.'

An outburst of applause greeted Mr. Littleton's statements. The applause continued for several seconds before Chairman Martin, who ruled yesterday that there should be no demonstration, restored quiet.

COMING IN SLOWLY

Ex-members of Imperials Not Asking War Gratuitie Quickly.

Ottawa, Jan. 23.—It is stated by the Militia Department that applications for war service gratuity by ex-members of the imperial forces who come within the provisions of the order-in-council passed on Dec. 1, 1919, following the report of the special committee of the House of Commons, are coming in very slowly.

STOP WHIPPING WOMEN

Inquiry in Atlanta Brings Out Strange Findings.

Atlanta, Ga., Jan. 23.—Whipping of women at the city stockade was ordered discontinued entirely by the prison committee of the Atlanta City Council yesterday after a police hearing of charges brought by the Atlanta Humane Society that women had been strapped to a contrivance resembling a chair and flogged.

Woman Is Chairman.

Brantford, Jan. 23.—Recognition of the worth of women in health matters has been given here by the election of Mrs. H. R. Frank to the chairmanship of the Board of Health at the inaugural meeting. Mrs. Frank last year took a very active part in health work while a member of the board, particularly with regard to the introduction of medical inspection in the schools.

30,000 Awarded the 1914-15 Star.

Ottawa, Jan. 23.—Thirty thousand Canadians have been awarded the 1914-15 star to date, according to the records of the Militia Department. Applications are still being received for them, and there are probably still some hundreds of men and many women who are eligible for them but have not received them yet.

Italian Railway Strike Falls.

Rome, Jan. 23.—Energetic steps by the Italian Government and an adverse attitude of the public seem to have brought about the failure of the railway strike. The national congress of employees in the postal, telephone and telegraph services has voted to resume work.

Eleven Years in Prison.

Ottawa, Jan. 23.—Eleven years in penitentiary was the sentence passed by Justice Lennox at the Court House yesterday afternoon upon William Lennox, who was found guilty by a jury on charge of manslaughter in connection with the death of his mother, Mrs. Margaret Lennox, on the 10th June last.
