KINGSTON DEFEATS QUEEN'S

IN JUNIOR O.H.A. GAME PLAYED ON MONDAY NIGHT.

Won Clean-cut Victory by a score of 5 to 3 in the Fastest Game of the Season in This Series.

In a Junior O.H.A. game at the covered rink on Monday night, the Kingston team defeated Queen's by a score of 5 to 3, in what is regarded as the fastest game this season in this series.

The game was played on good ice, before a good-sized crowd, and was featured by clean-cut playing on the part of both teams. It was brimful of interest, with many thrills, and the spectators certainly got the worth of their money.

Both teams were in good condition, and they went at it for all they were worth from bell to bell. Kingston was the first to score. Brown and Robinson each got one to their credit in the first stanza, while Hammet came across for the first and only tally for Queen's in this session, the first period ending 2 to 1 for Kingston.

In the second period both teams made one tally each, Gibson taking the honors for Queen's and Robinson poking in one for Kingston.

In the final set-to, Brown found the nets twice, while Gibson scored one for Queen's, making the final score 5 to 3 for Kingston.

The teams lined up as follows: Kingston—Goal, Lehman; defence, Roney, McLaughlin; forwards, Brown, Robinson, Lanos, Devlin, Stoen. Queen's—Goal, McNeill; defence, McKeivey and Hammel; forwards, Gibson, Swarton, Woodruff, McCarthy, Smith.

There are six teams in the Women's Hockey League at the University of Toronto, Victoria, St. Hilda's and University College are in one group, with McMaster, Medicine and Faculty of Education in another. The group winners will play off for the championship.

QUEEN'S WERE ROBBED OF GOAL IN MONTREAL

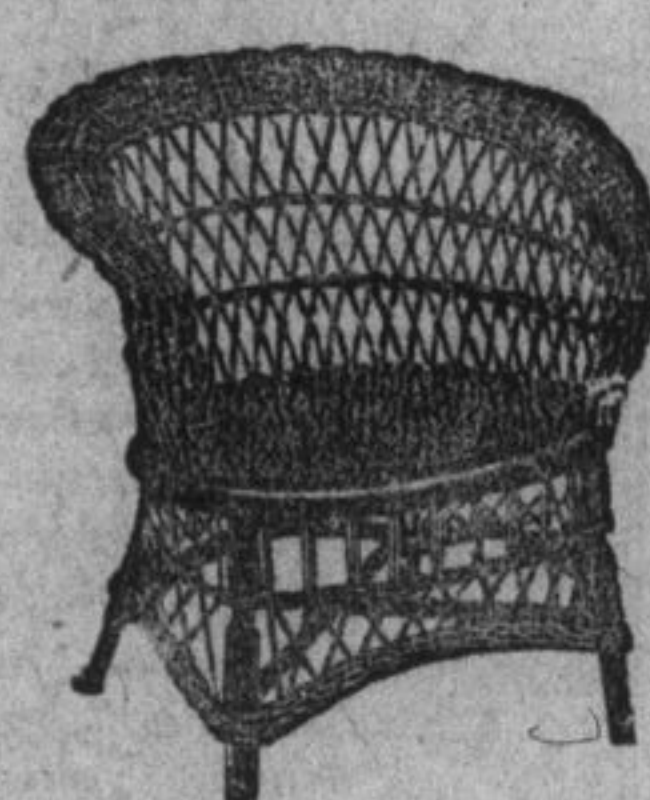
