## REV. C. CARTWRIGHT DEAD

FORMER KINGSTONIAN PASSED AWAY AT VANCOUVER.

For More Than Forty Years He Was Protestant Chaplain at Portsmouth Penitentiary—Did Much to Help Men to Get New Start in Life.

Rev. Conway Cartwright passed away on January 26th at the residence of his son, C. Edward Cartwright, Shaughnessy Heights, Vancouver, B.C. He was in his 83rd year, and had been very ill as a result of heart trouble since July. The Rev. Conway Cartwright, younger brother of the late Sir Richard Cartwright, was a son of the late Rev. Robert Cartwright—at one time chaplain to His Majesty's garrisons—and grandson of the late Hon. Richard Cartwright. On his mother's side, he belonged to an old North of Ireland family, and was a descendant of many notable people.

The Rev. Mr. Cartwright was a man of saintly character and brilliant intellect, who spent his life in doing good. He was the author of many works, but chiefly wrote under a "nom de plume."

Deceased was a graduate and B.A. of Trinity College, Dublin, and was ordained in Ireland by Primate Gregg. His first parish was in Belfast. Later he came to Canada, and was for some years curate of St. James' Cathedral, Toronto, and a friend of Bishop Strachan. Later he came to Kingston, but on retiring owing to ill-health resided in Vancouver, B.C.

He married Marie Letitia Johnson, of Ballymeash, County Antrim, Ireland, granddaughter of the Rev. Philip Johnson, most dearly loved vicar of Desriaghy, County Antrim. Rev. Mr. Conway Cartwright had three sons and five daughters. One daughter, Josephine, died as a child. His youngest son, C. T. Cartwright, of the Geological Survey, died in October, 1914. His surviving sons are: C. Edward Cartwright, of Shaughnessy Heights, Vancouver, B.C., and Brig.-Gen. G. S. Cartwright, C.B., C.M.G., of the Royal Engineers, Aldershot, England.

His daughters are Mrs. J. J. Telford, of Glenora, Kentucky; Mrs. F. Boucher Emery, of New Westminster, B.C.; Mrs. Arthur Matheson, of Ottawa, lately of Vancouver, B.C.; and Mrs. R. H. H. Alexander, of Vancouver, B.C.

For more than forty years, Mr. Cartwright was Protestant chaplain at the Portsmouth penitentiary, where he was known for his kindly and sympathetic interest in the many inmates confined in the institution. He was always endeavoring to help the unfortunate, and was most generous in his donations to men about to make a new start in life. He was known to give his clothing to discharged prisoners in cold weather, thus literally carrying out the injunctions of Scripture.

## TRACKED THREE BURGLARS

GEORGE HAYCOCK OF MONTREAL SECURED THEIR ARREST.

Followed Them in a Taxi After They Had Broken into His Apartment and Knocked Him Down.

The prompt action of George Haycock, of Montreal, son of Joseph Haycock, ex-M.P.P., formerly of Kingston, resulted in three burglars being rounded up in Montreal recently.

According to information received, Mr. Haycock, who lives in an apartment in Montreal, was aroused by a rap at the door at four o'clock in the morning. When he went down to the door he found three men who wanted to get in. When he asked them what they wanted, they replied that they were going in the house, but when Mr. Haycock told them that they could not enter, he got a crack in the face and was thrown down. The burglars entered the house, and carried away two suits of clothes, a lamp and \$75 in bills. Mr. Haycock, who was attired in his bath robe and slippers, went out of his house and up a pair of stairs into the next house, and then went out on the street and waited for the burglars to come out. He had only been waiting for a few minutes when the burglars appeared, and went to the corner and got a taxi and drove off. As soon as Mr. Haycock saw them get in the car he hired another taxi and followed them. When the car with the burglars stopped in front of a house, Mr. Haycock saw three policemen on duty, and he immediately called them, with the result that they entered the house and found the burglars with their booty. He secured a pair of trousers which they had stolen and put them on and went back to his apartment, while policemen took the burglars to the cells.
