# In the World of Sport

## GAMBLING ON SOCCER THREATENS THE GAME IN THE OLD COUNTRY

The English soccer authorities are genuinely anxious to keep the game clear of gambling and the players from book-making temptations and scandals, but have a very difficult task.

Some days ago a heavy fine was inflicted for circulating soccer betting coupons without the printer's name, and a much more serious case has just been investigated by the committee, who found, as regards the allegations in the recent Portsmouth-Bristol Rovers match, that two players of the former club, Hunter and Arnold, had divided £150 paid them by a bookmaker. The offenders have been permanently suspended and warned off. The arrangement was that the match should be drawn, and this actually happened, but Hunter did not play.

One of the surprises in the English cup tie games so far has been the success of the West Stanley club from the County of Durham. This team, which arrived in London tonight for the cup match with Tottenham on Saturday, are with two exceptions working coal miners.

## CARPENTIER MIGHT WIN

If Dempsey Didn't Finish Him in Eight or Ten Rounds.

When Frank Klaus, former middleweight champion, defeated Carpentier on a foul in nineteen rounds eight years ago, he was managed by George Engle, a well-known handler of boxers. Engle, the other day, praised Carpentier to the skies.

"Carpentier was only a boy when he fought Klaus in Europe," said Engle, "yet he exhibited wonderful gameness. Klaus was a terrific body puncher and as strong as an ox. Carpentier was the better boxer, but when Klaus began to direct his attacks to the Frenchman's stomach and ribs the latter's stamina soon left him."

"Carpentier was about seventeen years old at that time and hadn't stopped growing. Naturally, he lacked experience and wasn't able to stand unlimited punishment. Yet he was willing to fight, in spite of his weakened condition, when Descamps, his manager, ended the scrap by entering the ring."

"Persons who say that Carpentier isn't game talk through their hats. The Frenchman has the courage of a lion and likes to fight. He is a smart guy, thinks quickly and has natural skill in abundance. I don't say that Carpentier can whip Dempsey, but if they ever meet in the ring the American will not have a soft snap."

"Carpentier surely has improved a hundred per cent since I saw him last and, in my opinion, his remarkable speed and hitting will bother Dempsey a lot. If Dempsey should fall to end the battle inside of eight or ten rounds Carpentier might win."

**Canadians May Challenge.**  
A good deal of interest has been aroused among Canadian yachtsmen by the coming contest for the Americas Cup. The yachtsmen of the Great Lakes are keeping a weather eye on the cup race developments. Should Sir Thomas Lipton fail in his coming effort to lift the great yachting emblem, it would not be surprising to learn that the Canadians would be the next in line with a challenge.

**S.S.A.A.A. Basketball Games.**  
On Tuesday evening in the S.S.A.A.A. senior basketball series, St. Paul's and Baptist play in the first game, and Hebrews and Cooke's in the second game. The result of games has a great bearing on the standing of the league. At present four teams have only lost one game.

## JACK JOHNSON TO RETURN

Would Fight Dempsey—Ready to Face Year's Imprisonment.  
Jack Johnson, former heavyweight pugilistic champion of the world, plans to return to the United States, at once to face charges pending against him in Chicago, according to a letter. The former champion is confident he can arrange legal difficulties in time to fight Jack Dempsey before the latter meets Georges Carpentier, of France, and asserts Dempsey must meet him before he can claim the world's championship.

The letter was written by him to Charles F. Clyde, U. S. district attorney in Chicago. It said Johnson would go to New York by the way of Havana, arranging here for federal agents from Mr. Clyde's office to meet him in New York. Johnson requested Mr. Clyde to give him thirty-six hours' leeway after he arrived in Chicago, so that he might secure bondsmen and make other legal preparations. Johnson asserted at Mexico City that he weighed 215 pounds, but would go into training immediately after reaching the U. S., and would be able to easily make his old fighting weight. During the seven years that Johnson has been out of the U. S., he has visited virtually every country in the old world and South America.

Jack Johnson was tried in Chicago early in 1913 on charges of having violated the Mann "White Slave" law and, being convicted, was sentenced to a year's imprisonment in the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas. Johnson appealed, but before the case was argued before the higher court he forfeited his bail bond of \$15,000 by fleeing from his home near Chicago to Montreal. Late in June, 1913, he sailed for Europe, and has not been on American soil since that time.

## ANOTHER RACE TRACK.

Ottawa Connaught Park Jockey Club to Have a Rival.

The Connaught Park Jockey Club, Ottawa, is to have a rival organization, for which a charter has just been accorded to a number of prominent Hull citizens. The announcement is made in the Quebec Provincial Gazette, which states that a charter to a company capitalized about \$49,000, has been granted. The new company is to be known as the Laurier Park Jockey Club, and is incorporated by Messrs. J. Caron, Georges Montpetit, E. Cinqmars, J. Barnaby, J. P. Coulson and W. Flanagan. While the object of the company as announced in the incorporation notice is stated to be the promotion of horse breeding, riding, racing and polo it is understood it really means the creation of a half mile track, in conjunction with similar organizations in Montreal. The site of the new race track is stated to be on the Aylmer Road.

## The N.H.L. Race.

The first half of the N.H.L. race will be decided on Saturday night, when Canadiens go to Ottawa for the final game of the series. Both teams are tied and the winner of this game will have the right to play off in the final. George Kennedy, of the Canadiens, stated last night that the Flying Frenchmen would achieve the unexpected, they would beat the Senators right in Ottawa. Manager Quinn, of Quebec, declared that if his team can only shake the hoodoo that is stalking them they will defeat the St. Pat's on Saturday night at Quebec.
