**A SUCCESSFUL YEAR**

The annual statement of the Trusts and Guarantee Company, Limited, shows that the company has enjoyed a year of expanding business in all departments. During the past few years the company has steadily added to its organization in different parts of Canada and is now reaping the benefits of the constructive policies. The total guaranteed trust account, including securities on real estate, bonds, debentures, stocks, and government, provincial, municipal and rural district bonds, and cash in bank show a gain, to \$5,263,413 over \$5,182,061 at the end of the previous year.  
The steady advance of the estates and agency business is indicated by total mortgages on real estate of a value of \$2,194,639, up from \$1,629,620, and other securities, including government and municipal bonds and unrealized original assets amounting to \$11,619,680, as compared \$10,913,613. With the cash in bank this places the total assets under estates and agency account at \$14,946,958, up from \$12,783,554. As a result of the increased business during the year the total assets of the company have gained to \$22,122,419, as compared with \$20,475,129.  
The larger business handled has resulted in the company being able to report net profits for the year of \$110,175. These profits, added to the balance of profit and loss carried forward from the previous year, brought the total amount available for distribution up to \$175,419. Of this amount dividends at the rate of 6 per cent per annum took \$82,858, leaving amount to be carried forward to the new year of \$92,561.

### ANOTHER BIG THEATRE.

Paramount Theatres, Limited, to Spend \$500,000 Here.  
Yesterday the Whig announced that Allen Bros., Toronto, had secured a site on Princess street, and would erect within the next few months an up-to-date theatre at a cost of a quarter of a million dollars.

To-day George Wilson, manager of the Strand Theatre, tells the Whig that he has been authorized by his company, Paramount Theatres, Limited, to announce to the public that they will build a handsome theatre in Kingston at a cost of a half million dollars. The site has already been secured on Princess street, and building operations will begin about the first of May, so that the house will be completed by the beginning of September.

Paramount Theatres, Limited, is a \$16,000,000 corporation, of which Lord Beaverbrook is the head. It is at present building a \$1,000,000 theatre in Toronto for Pantages vaudeville, and also controls the Regent, Strand and Alhambra theatres in Toronto, and two large houses in Hamilton. It has leased the Strand Theatre, this city, and has arranged for the erection of forty-three theatres in Canada before the end of 1921. Kingstonians will be pleased to learn that Pantages vaudeville will be shown at the new Kingston theatre. The spending of three-quarters of a million dollars in the erection of new entertainment enterprises alone in this city during the coming spring and summer will give employment to a large number of men and provide the city with first-class picture and vaudeville entertainment.
