DR. G. W. BELL TELLS WHAT HE HAS BEEN DOING

Has Received Few Complaints Regarding Quality of Milk-Makes Examination of Cows and Water there for two years less one day.

When interviewed regarding the milk supply of the city, Dr. George W. Bell, milk inspector, stated that at the present time it is very satisfactory. He had during the past year been very busy visiting dairy farms, and inspecting cows and their water supply. There were examin in all 4,500 cows, in Ernesttown, Storrington, Portland, Pittsburg and Kingston townships, points from which milk is brought to the city for sale. In winter it takes 7,000 quarts of milk to supply the city and this quantity is furnished at the present time from 1,200 to 1,400 cows. tals, and storekeepers. There are thirty milk venders selling milk on the streets, being an increase of four during the year. An estimate of the amount of milk used per day per citizen, by Dr. Bell, is one half pint for every man, woman and child. In additional control of the combined bands.

Dr. Bell said: "On this occasion I had to go nearly to Brockville on the east. It entailed a great deal of work but nothing unusual was found on that occasion. In the summer time, fewer cows are needed to supply the city, but this winter the cattle are generally thin owing to the high cost of feed and grain, the milk flow is less in consequence, and a larger number of consequence, and a larger number of cows are needed. In view of this fact, we are very fortunate regarding the price of milk. It is cheap at 12 and 14 cents a quart, cheaper in Kings sten. I find, than in any other city of

Asked regarding the health of the cows, Dr. Bell said that he found two that showed symptoms of tuber-culosis and ordered them destroyed and they were destroyed. There were others that had diseased udders. He was very particular about the cows that supplied milk to the city be-cause he regarded milk as the most valuable diet for children, invalids and aged persons. "For myself," said the doctor, "if I had to choose between bread and milk as a diet, I would choose milk, because I believe it contains more of the elements that sustain life and promote health than

"Did you receive many complaints from citizens or from institutions regarding the quality of milk?" he was

"Very few," and they were inves-tigated immediately," he replied.
