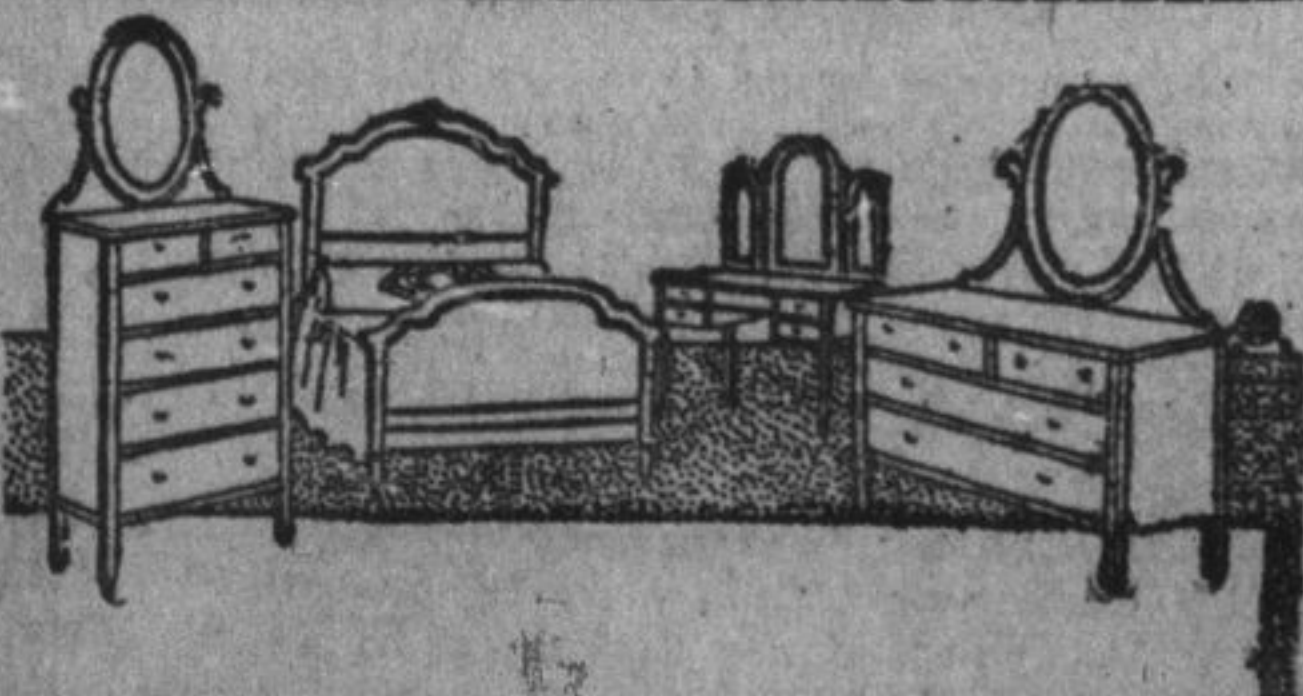

## RECITAL AT ST. GEORGE'S

BY R. R. F. HARVEY, ORGANIST, AND SEVERAL VOCALISTS.

Miss Waldron, Luke Gask, C. B. S. Harvey and Master Peter Fair Contributed to a Delightful Programme.

An organ recital was given in St. George's Cathedral on Saturday afternoon by R. R. F. Harvey that delighted a large audience. Mr. Harvey holds a high place in Kingston as an organist, being naturally gifted with ability to interpret the masters of that instrument. St. George's organ is one of the best in Canada, and its magnificence in tone and power was adequately shown in the number chosen by Mr. Harvey. His last number, played by request, was "Tempest in the Alps," by Breitenbach, and the flashlight effects following the crash and roll of the thunder of the organ, gave a most realistic impression.

Mr. Harvey was assisted by his brother, C. B. S. Harvey, baritone, who sang "One Sweetly Solenn Thought" very effectively; Miss Waldron, soprano, who sang "Repentance," by Gounod; Luke Gask, baritone, who sang "It is Enough," from Elijah; and Master Peter Fair, boy soprano, who sang "Come, Ye, Messiah, and 'Jesu, Saviour Pilot Me.'" Miss Waldron possesses a very pleasing voice, large compass and purity of tone, and her rendering of "Repentance" was greatly appreciated. C. B. S. Harvey's singing ability is well known. Mr. Gask is warmly welcomed in musical circles, as his singing is pleasing. Master Peter Fair has a beautiful boy soprano voice, and he has received all his training from Mr. Harvey.

## THE SECRET OF SUCCESS

IS IN FAITH, PERSEVERANCE AND PATIENCE.

Rev. C. V. Pilcher, of Wycliffe College, Toronto, Preaches in St. James' on the Forward Movement.

Rev. C. V. Pilcher, of Wycliffe Theological College, Toronto, was the special preacher at St. James' church on Sunday at both services. His subject was the Forward Movement. At the evening service, which was largely attended by men, the speaker emphasized "faith, perseverance and patience," and showed that these qualities were the secret of success in everything. He spoke of the need for fidelity in the pursuit of the object sought; and, as an illustration, directed attention to Caleb, who lived after forty years in the wilderness, and entered the promised land with the children of Israel. He avoided the "short cuts," and at the age of four score and five years received the fulfillment of God's promise. At that age, too, he was young in spirit. The speaker cited Byron for a contrast, who declared at thirty-five, "My days are in the yellow leaf." But Byron had spent his life in the pursuit of pleasure, and his capacity for enjoyment was gone.

The service was conducted by Rev. T. W. Savary, while the lessons were read by George E. Hague and W. J. Saunders. Dr. H. P. Huyck gave a splendid address on the Forward Movement, in which he said that it meant that all were called to consecrate their lives to the service of the church. The music was beautifully rendered by the choir. A male quartette sang "Lead Kindly Light" very sweetly.

Spoke at St. Luke's. R. F. Elliott was the special speaker on the Forward Movement at St. Luke's church on Sunday evening. He dealt with the unprecedented state of the minds of the people, due to the general condition of unrest and saw the only remedy in the church. He realized her responsibility, and called upon all her people for loyal support in every undertaking. Mrs. Percy Bell sang the solo in the anthem, "Abide With Me," very sweetly.

### THERE IS NO MORALITY.

Terrible Teaching of Reds in Russia—Corrupt the Young.

Under the rule of the Bolsheviks in Russia children are taught to renounce God, they are herded into schools, where there is no supervision, no restraint, no religion and where morals are indescribable; they are given literature which poisons their minds and turns them away from everything which is good and pure in this life. Their main recreation is dancing, and they dance and dance. Deceits have gone forth that parents have no right to keep their children at home, and boys and girls of tender years are torn from homesides of refinement and placed in institutions with immoral surroundings, where their minds are poisoned.

This message came recently from a woman missionary in Russia to Mrs. Penn-Lewis, residing in England, who has had it published.

"Hundreds of children are dying daily of hunger, neglect and infectious diseases," says the writer. "The death rate is appalling. But death is not the worst. It is the lack of deliverance from the hands of those who murder souls as well as bodies. Children—masses of them—are bribed by especially good food, by flattery, over-indulgence, theatres, dancing and other attractions to renounce God, never utter his name, never pray, never go anywhere they can hear anything about Him except in blasphemy. Imagine a large group of children gathered on a fete day in front of one of the palaces, emptied of its owners, listening to the following speech which is put in their hands, called you together to tell you that everything now is yours. You are the masters and have a right to everything you see. You can take, use, do whatever you like, and need not at all mind stealing, for you can always leave off."

"Former superintendents and teachers in schools established many years ago and conducted on principles of order, propriety and good solid teaching have all been replaced by tools and slaves of some uneducated younger who is put at the head of everything, although often unable to sign his name. These schools are now mixed, morals indescribable. "Robbery thrives. Educated people are being exterminated. Prisons are crowded with men and women who are guilty of no offence. Every day hundreds of people are led to the slaughter for no other reason other than to satisfy the cussedness of the Bolshevik class. Some who have money are able to pay their way out of prison. There are no private burial grounds or graves, all having become national property. Nothing can be bought, except on permit. Factories are looted, largely because competent workmen will not submit to those who are totally incapable of managing the business. Thousands are dying an every hand from starvation and disease and no hand is held forth to relieve the misery."

The picture painted by the missionary is one of utter despair. She appeals to England and America to lend assistance, not by armed force, but by persuasion, by education. She says that there are still many in Russia, who still have good in them and welcome any movement to bring organization out of chaos.

### A Clemenceau Story.

In a little village of La Vandoe, France, there lived a young doctor who frequently drove into the nearest city. At the gates of this city was the customary customs officer who imposed the lawful duty upon all edibles entering the French town. This doctor, wishing to take some poultry with him and wishing to be honest and at the same time not to pay duty, drove into the city one day in a little cart with a pretty girl on either side of him. At the gate the guard asked: "Have you nothing to declare, doctor?" "Nothing but two chickens and a rooster," he replied. The customs officer laughingly allowed him to pass. Not long ago this same evader of customs passed through the gate, and an old rooster, tired customs officer said to him: "Ah, doctor, I am glad to see you back and to know that the rooster has returned a tiger"—and Clemenceau laughed at the memory of his smuggling.

### Royal Shrine Now Neglected.

The Temple of Heaven in Peking is a Chinese temple without idols, a temple sacred to the use of Chinese emperors; a temple that is not one building, but a park several miles in area, with wonderful pagodas and altars scattered among its groves.

The Temple of Heaven has been for centuries as it is now. There is a red tiled wall inclosing a grove, and within, a yellow tiled wall inclosing another grove, with blue-roofed temples in unexpected places. In the most secluded spot is the Altar of Heaven, the temple's holy of holies. This Altar of Heaven is said by the Chinese to be the centre of the earth.

Since the last living representative of the dragon prayed for prosperity at the Altar of Heaven the temple has become neglected and moss grown.

Irishmen's Increased Exports. The report on Irish trade issued for the year 1917 shows that imports rose from £74,467,283 in 1912 to £120,621,632 in 1917, the corresponding figures for exports being £75,877,389 and £134,662,448. It is pointed out that this great increase is due entirely to increased prices. It also emphasizes the fact that Ireland, an agricultural country, is largely dependent on other countries for her farm produce and food stuffs. In the years 1914 to 1917 the export of horses exclusive of army horses totaled £1,235.
