Making Ice In the Tropics. To make ice in Mexico the natives take the leaf of the cactus plant, which may be a foot and a half or two feet long and hollowed out in form, and fill it with water. This at night they suspend well up in the

air. In the morning the water has become ice. Then they put several of the layers of the ice thus formed together to make a bulk of it. In the dry atmosphere the rapid evaporation causes the water to freeze, on the same principle that water put in porous jars and allowed to stand in the sun becomes cool.
