The Finance Report.
These recommendations of the finance committee were adopted:
That funds are available to pay the increase in salaries to the officers and members of the fire department, and also to pay the salary of \$500 for a clerk in the engineer's office.

That the mayor be authorized to attend all conventions, meetings, etc., during the year to represent the city, when in his judgment it is advisable to do so at the expense of the corporation.

That the request of the 14th Regiment, P.W.O.R., for rebate rental Ontario Hall, Jan. 14th, be granted, less the amount of actual expenses.

That an additional sum of \$1,200 be added to the temporary appropriation of industries committee.

That the city council endorse the scheme as recommended by the mayor in his inaugural address regarding memorials, and that the cost of the same be met by the sale of debentures under the War Measures Act.

The Board of Works.

The Board of Works made these recommendations:
That tenders be called for 500 cubic yards sand, to be stored in the fair grounds, winter delivery.

That on the recommendation of the city engineer the following streets be closed:
Brock street, from Bagot to Alfred street.

That Bagot street be paved with a permanent pavement on concrete base from Princess to Ordinance street, and asphalt macadam on the present road bed from Ordinance to Charles street.

That the following walks be constructed this year:
Bagot street, west side, from Brock to Princess street.
Charles street, south side, from Rideau to Bagot street.
Davison street, south side, from Ellerbeck street to Livingston avenue.
Mack street, south side, from Albert to Nelson street.
North street, north side, from Barrie street, westerly 100 feet.
Pembroke street, east side, from Union to King street.
Raglan road, east side, from Rodan to Patrick street.
Stephen street, south side, from Sixth street, north side, from Chatham to Alfred street.
Toronto street, west side, from the north limit of lot 30 northerly to Dundas street.

That a concrete curb be constructed on the west side of Nelson street from Princess to Johnson street, also a concrete curb on the east side of King street in front of Dr. J. C. Connell's residence, and also in front of Mr. Bailey's property on the south side of Princess street, on the Bath road.

That the boulevard on Kensington avenue between Union street and Edgell be turned over to the committee on parks.

That Miss A. Goodearle be appointed clerk in the Board of Works office at a salary of \$800 per annum.

Civic Health.

The civic health report contained the following:
That the offer of Hall Bros. to supply the corporation with three cars choice body, hard metal, 40 inches long, at \$6.75 per cord, f.o.b. Applehill, be accepted.

Industries Committee.

The industries committee reported as follows:
That in order to promote the best interests of the city from an industrial point, your committee thought it advisable, and has joined with a committee from the Board of Trade, with Ald. Steacy as chairman. This committee thus formed has appointed Ald. Steacy and J. M. Campbell as executive. The expenses incurred by this joint committee will be paid by the city council and the Board of Trade, and that part to be paid by the city will be recommended by the city's industries committee. It is the intention of this committee to obtain the services of a capable man who shall devote his whole time as industrial commissioner and secretary of the Board of Trade. It is thought advisable that he should be secretary of the Board of Trade, as this will put him in direct contact with all the prospective industries which may locate in this district. Ald. Steacy, chairman industries committee, and J. M. Campbell, president Board of Trade, will give direct assistance to this official, and when a proposition is sufficiently developed will lay the matter before the joint committee, who if they think favorably of it will recommend the same to council.

Ald. Steacy in reply to Ald. Patterson stated that it was deemed in the best interests of the city to work in conjunction with the Board of Trade, in regard to the appointment of a commissioner a returned soldier would be given the preference.

The following resolution was carried on motion of Ald. Pease and Phillips: "In future where any municipal office becomes vacant or new one is created that a newspaper advertisement to this effect be inserted in order that prospective applicants may have an opportunity of applying for the same."

On motion of Alds. Kent and O'Connor, the industries committee was asked to make the hotel committee of council and given power to add to its number in this connection.

Charles W. McGregor, a returned soldier, and Miss Ann Dow Frame, a Scottish nurse whom he had met in an hospital in France, when wounded, were united in marriage in the Reformed Presbyterian church at Almonte.

C. K. Grigg, for the past 12 years assessor for the town of Renfrew, has been appointed assessor for Almonte at a salary of \$275.

Bernard E. Melvor, Pembroke, died on Saturday, aged seventy-nine years. He was a teacher for many years, and was retired on a pension. A wife and seven children survive.

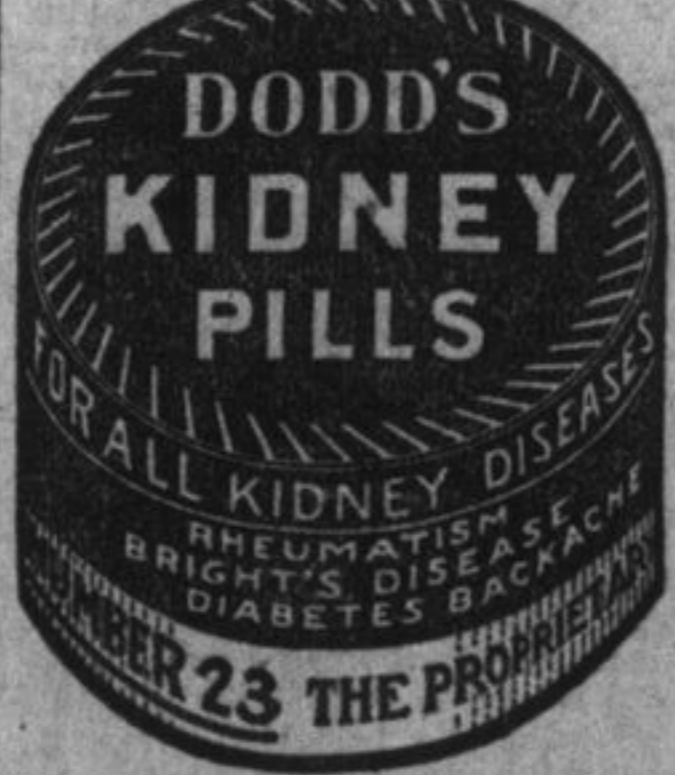

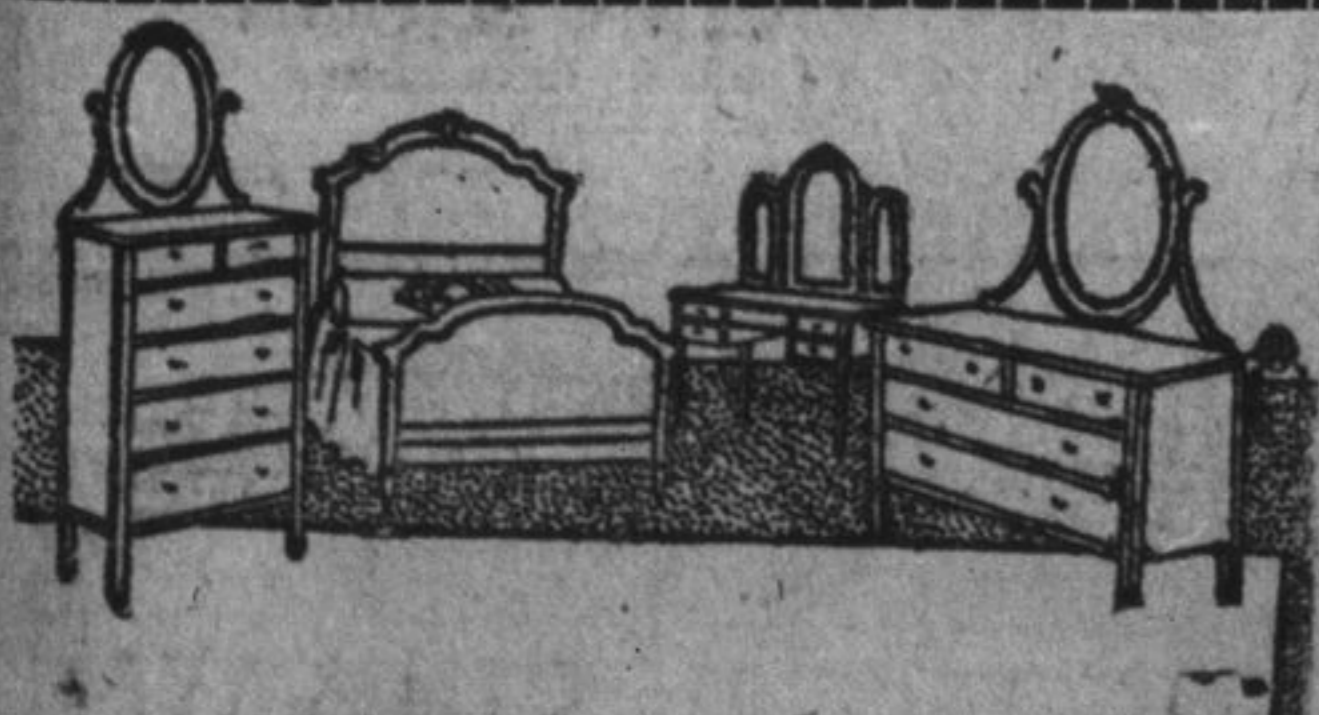

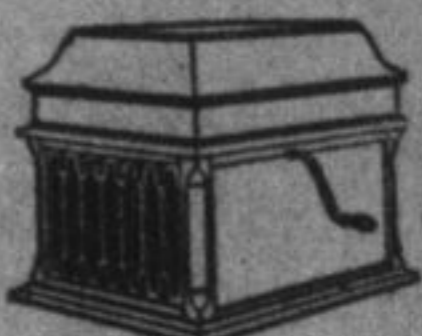
