GIVING GENEROUS SERVICE

Each Family Cares For Soldier's Grave.

Word has been received by the office of the Overseas Military Forces of Canada from M. Gustave Casey, president of the association formed by the people of Mons to care for the graves of Allied soldiers. The burgo-masters and inhabitants of the 81 communes of the district of Mons are assisting the association. The aim is to allot one grave to a family to be cared for and beautified by that family.

Further, the family must endeavor to get into communication with the next-of-kin of the deceased soldier and inform them that they are in charge of his grave, and if the next-of-kin propose to visit Belgium they will be the guests of the family in charge of the grave whilst there.

The owners of the ground in which the deceased soldiers are buried, through the association, have given a free title for each plot to the families interested. Many headstones have been erected by public subscriptions and on the anniversaries of the two battles of Mons (August 23 and November 11) homage is paid to the deceased and wreaths are laid upon their graves. The association now reports that they have now on their charge the graves of 100 Allied soldiers.

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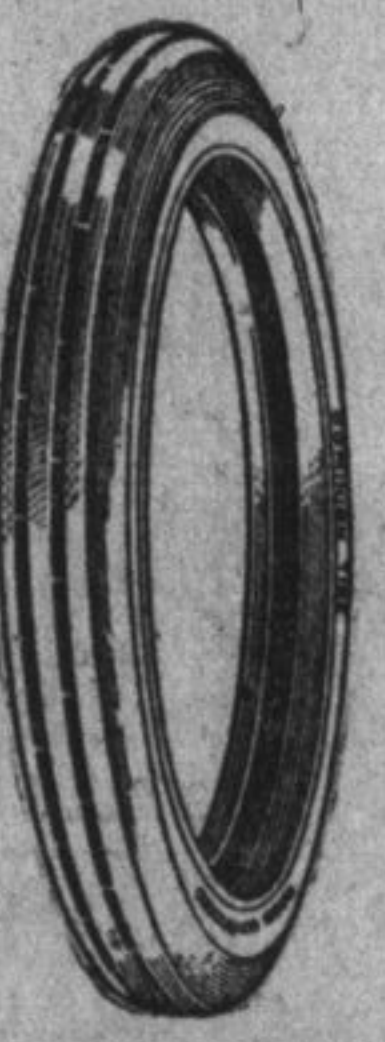
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
