UNVEILING AT INVERARY

**OF A TABLET IN MEMORY OF
SCHOOL GRADUATES**

Who Fell During the War—Ad-
dresses by Hon. R. H. Grant, Dr.
Bruce Taylor, A. M. Rankin and
F. Sine.

Inverary, Feb. 7.—The agricultural
hall at Inverary was the scene of a
most interesting and impressive cere-
mony on the afternoon of Friday,
Feb. 6th, when a cast-bronze tablet
in memory of the graduates of In-
verary public school who fell in the
great war was unveiled. At 2:30 the
hall was well filled, and the follow-
ing gentlemen occupied seats on the
platform: Hon. R. H. Grant, minister
of education for Ontario; Dr. R.
Bruce Taylor, principal of Queen's
University; A. M. Rankin, M.P.P. for
South Frontenac; S. A. Truscott,
M.A., inspector of public schools for
South Frontenac; F. Sine, M.A., prin-
cipal of Sydenham High School; Rev.
Mr. Oliver, of Inverary; and Rev. Mr.
Curry, of Sunbury. Mr. Rankin oc-
cupied the chair, and explained the
purpose of the meeting.

After a chorus by the school, which
was conducted by the teacher, Mrs.
Arthur, Inspector Truscott unveiled
the tablet. He had been a teacher in
the Inverary school for four years,
and spoke feelingly of the different
boys who had made the great sacrifice.
They were: George Cochrane,
Elmer Sheppard, Michael Harpell,
Stanley Curtis and Claud Lake. The
unveiling was followed by prayer by
Mr. Oliver.

This was followed by an address by
Hon. Mr. Grant, who outlined in gen-
eral terms the educational policy
of the new government. He made
particular reference to consolidated
schools and the provision which had
been made for them by his prede-
cessor, Dr. Cody.

Then came a violin solo by Irwin
Stafford, of Sydenham, who was accom-
panied by his sister, Miss Ruby
Stafford.

Dr. Taylor, of Queen's followed in
an able and inspiring address. He
spoke of some of the events of the
war in which the Inverary boys fell.

New C.P.R. Station.

estimates for the construction this
year of a new station at Carleton
Place. The running shed will be re-
placed and the tracks re-arranged to
provide for the new location. The
new building will be of stone con-
struction.

Visit at Renfrew.
The Duke of Devonshire, Govern-
or-General of Canada, is to pay a
visit to Renfrew on a Thursday after-
noon. On his way to the west he
proposes to make a halt here of be-
tween two and three hours and in-
spect the hospital, schools and other
points of interest. The council is
taking steps to extend a fitting wel-
come to the vice-regal party, and the
afternoon of Thursday will find
Renfrew en fête.

Allan Airth Writes of Africa.
An interesting letter is from Allan
Airth, son of Mr. and Mrs. John
Airth, Renfrew, who served as a
master mechanic with an American
forestry battalion. After the signing
of the armistice the French govern-
ment bought the American ma-
chinery to use in their forests in
Africa and Mr. Airth accepted a
position as superintendent of con-
struction. He writes from Lake
"Tchombie," Gabon, Africa.

Post Office Employees' Dance.
The annual dance was held by the
post office employees and letter car-
riers in the city hall on Monday
night, and it was a most successful
event. The music was furnished by
the S. J. Salisbury orchestra, and
there were one hundred and fifty
couples on the floor at one time. Re-

He showed the broader meaning of
religion which the war had emphasize-
d. Religion is not a system of
"do's," but rather one of "be's."
It is the giving of the best we
have for our fellow-men, and the de-
parted boys had typified this in its
highest sense. He also dealt with
the broader conception of education,
showing how it transcends the mere
acquiring of information and catches
a vision of the great, the beautiful
and the humanitarian aspects of life.

Claude McRory, of Sydenham,
then gave a flute solo. He was accom-
panied by his sister, Miss Glee Mc-
Rory.

Mr. Sine spoke of sacrifice in the
individual and in the national life,
and told how the boys had died to
safeguard Canada, one of the strong-
holds of sane democracy. He con-
trasted conditions in Russia at pre-
sent under Bolshevism and in France
during the reign of terror, beginning
in 1789, with those in Canada, where
democracy is just and rational, and
he attributed the difference largely
to the presence in practically all parts
of Canada of our little school houses
in rural communities.

Mr. Curry told of experiences at
the outbreak of hostilities and of
some conditions existing in the pub-
lic schools a few years ago. He also
spoke of the influence of the country
school on the national life.

After another chorus by the school,
Mr. Dixon and Mr. Duff moved that
a vote of thanks be tendered to all
who had assisted at the ceremony.

After the meeting, a splendid supper
was served by the Inverary ladies
to those who had assisted at the
meeting at the home of Andrew Mc-
Fadden, reeve of Storrington.

Great praise is due to the trustees,
Messrs. Duff, Dixon and Barr for
their enterprise and thoughtfulness
and practical patriotism in having se-
cured the splendid memorial which
was unveiled, and which will be plac-
ed in the public school.
