Died in New York.
 The death occurred on Tuesday of Sarah Kilbourn, widow of A. H. Merrill, Brockville, at the home of her son-in-law, W. E. Cook, New York. The deceased was born in Kingston, eighty-three years ago. Her husband predeceased her twenty-six years. The body will be interred in Brockville.

Is Seriously Ill.
 Born to Mr. and Mrs. George Johnstone, at Rochester, Feb. 8th, a son, before marriage Mrs. Johnstone was Miss Evelyn J. Bryant, Cape Vincent, N.Y. According to reports received by Mrs. Judson M. Grant, Mrs. Johnstone is in hospital and is very seriously ill with influenza-pneumonia.

Captain Passes Away.
 Word reached Buffalo, N.Y., vessel offices of the sudden death of Captain Leander J. Bennett, seventy-one years old, at his residence here. Captain Bennett was known all along the lakes. He was born on Wolfe Island, and at an early age started sailing out of Bay City. He sailed boats for one owner twenty-one years, and retired after having made one trip last spring.

The Late Anson G. Switzer.
 Another old citizen passed to his reward, in the person of Anson G. Switzer, whose death occurred Thursday. Mr. Switzer was born at Switzer, Ont., August, 8th, 1836, and so was in his eighty-fourth year. In June, 1860, he married Clarinda Maria Williams, who becomes his widow after a companionship of sixty years. Their family consisted of three sons, and one daughter. The two eldest are deceased.

To Vote On a By-law.
 A by-law to erect or locate an industry in Brockville, will be voted on, Feb. 23rd. It is to locate in Murray's field what is officially known as Machinery & Foundries, Ltd. It has been popularly called the Gardner iron foundry, and anyone knowing the push, energy and progressive nature of Jim Gardner will realize that it means a big thing towards Brockville's industrial expansion. The aggregate amount of money to be raised by an issue of debentures is \$20,000.

Invented the Spring Bed.
 Mr. and Mrs. James Liddy, Cape Vincent, N.Y., where they made their home for many years are now at Chautauq. He is aged ninety-two years and she is eighty-seven years. In 1850 Mr. Liddy invented the first spring bed ever used. His idea of a spring bed was fashioned after the old spring buggy, and met with no small amount of ridicule by those who were let into this secret. However, Houshaw & VanBuren, Watertown, N.Y., who were in the furniture business, took up the scheme, worked it out, and as a result the spring bed of today is the evolution of Mr. Liddy's idea, which he might have worked out for himself, but for the lack of funds.

 A quiet but pretty wedding took place on Wednesday, Feb. 11th, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. John E. Peters when their third daughter, Edna Florence, was united in marriage to Charles Wellington Jeffrey, eldest son of Mrs. Rebecca Jeffrey,

The groom also looked well in a suit of navy blue serge. After the ceremony the guests repaired to the dining room where a sumptuous dinner was served. The four sisters of the bride acted as waiters. The bride and groom left amid the good wishes of their many friends for an extended honeymoon. On their return they will take up residence on the groom's farm in Florida.

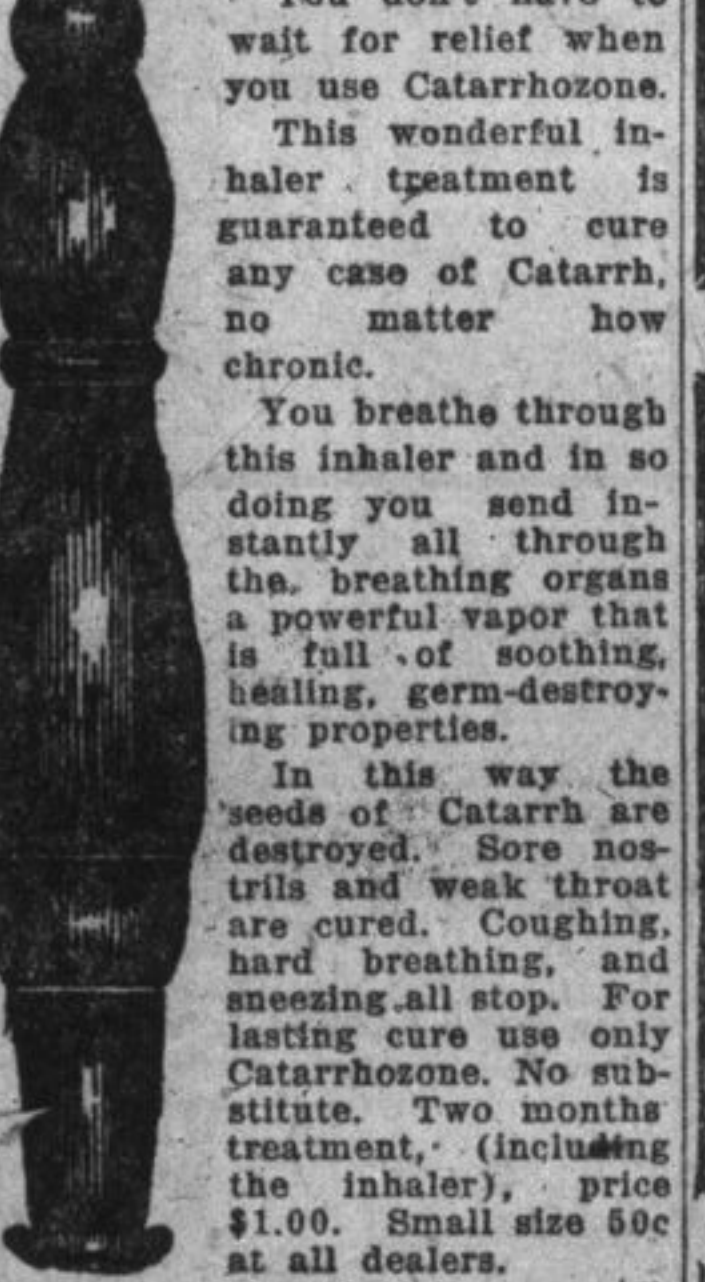
