### OPPOSE GRANT TO A CANADIAN TEAM

Under the caption "Athletic Joy-riding" the Ottawa Citizen discusses editorially the Dominion Government grant of \$15,000 to the Canadian Olympic committee, and says: "The athletic authorities of this country should devote to their time and energies and whatever funds may be granted them by the Government in developing athletics with a fair chance of making a respectable showing in world contests. The time to do that is between these contests. The plan of selecting athletes on the eve of the Olympic games and sending them abroad—notwithstanding the fact that their records make it clear that they have little or no chance of figuring successfully in the games—should not be encouraged, at least not by the expenditure of public funds."

### CARPENTIER SAILS ABOUT MARCH 13TH

Georges Carpentier, champion heavyweight of Europe will be accompanied by three prominent fighters when he sails next month for America. M. Deschamps, manager of the challenger for the world title, announced at Paris that he would bring Charles Ekdou, bantam champion of Europe; Papin, a French lightweight and Lenoir, former heavyweight champion of Belgium, with him on a quest for bouts with America. Carpentier has now contracts in Los Angeles for \$50,000. Deschamps said. At the present rate of exchange it totals about 700,000 francs. The party is to sail from Havre on the Touraine, scheduled to leave between March 10th and 12th.

### Japs Playing Good Hockey.

It is surprising the strides being taken by the young Japanese population in the different sports which are so popular with their white brethren. The Asahis, a Vancouver Japanese athletic club, is playing American games with considerable success. Last summer the baseball team showed some real class against local and outside teams. This winter the Japs have taken to ice hockey. The sport is new to them, but they are mastering the finer points of the game. The little goal-tender of the Asahis has shown that he has the makings of a player by his clever handling of some hard shots.
