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PLAY OFF IN BELLEVILLE

KINGSTON-PETERBORO GAME ON THURSDAY NIGHT

If the Belleville Rink Can Be Secured—Several Hundred Hockey Fans Will Accompany the Kingston Team.

Providing the rink can be secured, the sudden death game to declare the winner of the O.H.A. semi-finals between Kingston and Peterboro will be played in Belleville on Thursday night. After the game on Monday evening, the management of the two teams got together and agreed upon Belleville. It is expected that about six or seven hundred followers of the Kingston team will accompany it.

Collegiate Institute Hockey. On Monday in the inter-form hockey competition held at the skating rink of the Kingston Collegiate Institute, 4B won from 4A by a score of 4 to 1, and won the round. The teams were:

Large Attendance at Game. The attendance at the Kingston-Peterboro game on Monday evening was 1,829. The largest attendance at any game this season was 1,757, when Kingston and Queen's clashed.
