**TO HAVE SPECIAL CLINIC**

**THE CHOKE OF A SITH LEFT IN HANDS OF LOCALS.**

The Provincial Board Will Afford Valuable Assistance to Each of the Clinics Established — Kingston's Location Is the General Hospital.

It is the intention of the Provincial Board of Health to assist local Boards of Health to establish special clinics for the treatment of venereal disease. The board feels that the choice of a site for the special clinics in the various municipalities should be left to a certain extent in the hands of the local authorities who understand local conditions. The board would suggest, however, that where existing facilities already exist, as in the case of hospitals, etc., other things being equal, these facilities should be used. The board will afford the following assistance to each clinic established:

(1) For the purchase of furnishings and apparatus for a special clinic, \$1,000. (It is thought that the cost of the apparatus, etc., will not exceed this amount.)

(2) For each out patient treatment for gonorrhoea, 50 per cent. For each out patient treatment for syphilis, 50 per cent. (These treatments not to be given more than once daily.) For each out patient treatment for syphilis in addition, free salvarsan for all free patients in the clinic—as soon as the Provincial Board of Health has the authority to make it. (This has been promised by the Dominion Government, and no doubt the authority will arrive within the next month.)

(3) In the case of patients treated in hospitals the sum of 25 per cent. in addition to the above will be paid to the hospital for each day of in-door treatment up to three months, at the end of which time the in-door grant will cease.

(4) Standard record forms for the use of these special clinics will be printed and supplied by the board. In return for this the board will require that the clinics will be kept up to a certain standard.

(1) This special clinic shall be for the treatment of venereal diseases which include syphilis, gonorrhoea and chancroid.

(2) The apparatus and furnishings for the clinic shall be as follows: (See schedule (a).)

(3) The personnel of the clinic shall consist of:

(a) One specialist in venereal diseases who shall be appointed by the local Board of Health in consultation with the hospital if the clinic is in connection with a hospital, or by the local Board of Health in other cases.

(b) Medical assistants as found necessary appointed on the same basis.

(c) One full time special worker who shall be a graduate nurse.

(d) One clerk if the clinic is treating more than forty cases per week.

(e) One male orderly.

(f) If possible, one under-graduate nurse to assist in the clinic.

(4) All treatment in the clinic shall be free.

(5) At least one night and two day clinics shall be held per week.

(6) Separate hours shall be set aside for men and women in the clinic; also, if possible, separate hours for the treatment of gonorrhoea and syphilis.

(7) Special reports will be required by the provincial board, and will be rendered through the local Board of Health on forms supplied by the provincial board. It is thought that these reports should be rendered weekly.

(8) The clinic, including its records, apparatus, etc., shall be at all times open to inspection by an inspector of the Provincial Board of Health, whose duty it shall be to see that the clinic is at all times being kept up to the standard.

(9) A system of treatment for both gonorrhoea and syphilis satisfactory to this inspector shall be carried on at the clinic.

(10) The municipality will be expected to advance an amount for upkeep of the clinic or clinics which shall be approximately equal to the amount advanced by the Provincial Board of Health.

(11) The social service nurse shall follow up cases outside the clinic to see that no treatments are being missed, and also to see that any possible contacts are examined.

(12) Accounts should be rendered at the end of each month, and will be paid on the board's certificate.

(13) The board reserves the right to modify these rules if such should be in the interest of the clinic be deemed necessary.

Dr. John W. S. McCullough, chief health officer for Ontario, was in the city in consultation with medical men. It is quite understood that the clinic in Kingston will be associated with the General Hospital. Dr. R. Roy McClenahan, who accompanied Dr. McCullough, will likely be in charge here.
