LIQUOR UNDER CARD TABLE

SIDNEY BOVEY WAS FINED \$200 AND COSTS IN POLICE COURT.

Police Discovered Liquor When They Paid Visit to Apartments Early in Morning—Charge of Keeping Gambling House Further Enlarged.

Magistrate Farrell found Sidney Bovey guilty on a charge of having liquor in a place other than a private dwelling at the police court on Thursday morning, and imposed a fine of \$200 and costs of three months. A further remand for another week was made in the second charge against Bovey, that of being the keeper of a gambling house. The star witness in this case cannot be located, and the Crown has been forced to have the case postponed.

Bovey, it will be remembered, was taken in charge as a result of the work of Constables Nicholas Timmerman and Leslie Clark. He has apartments on the north side of Princess street, between Bagot and Montreal streets. Bovey pleaded "not guilty," and was defended by Mr. Smith, of the firm of Cunningham & Smith, but the magistrate, after hearing the evidence of the two constables in the case registered a conviction.

There is a hallway which is used in common to reach Bovey's apartments. About 1.30 o'clock, on the morning of February 7th, Constables Timmerman and Clarke paid a visit to these apartments. In a back room a number of men were seated around a table, and were more or less playing poker, so it is alleged. As he entered the room the eagle eye of Constable Timmerman caught a bottle of Imperial whiskey sitting under the table. The liquor was confiscated.

Bovey went into the box in his own defence. He declared that he knew nothing whatever about the liquor the police found under the table. The men in the room had come to his apartments on his invitation. Bovey declared that he kept no liquor on the premises, which were used as his own private dwelling.
