

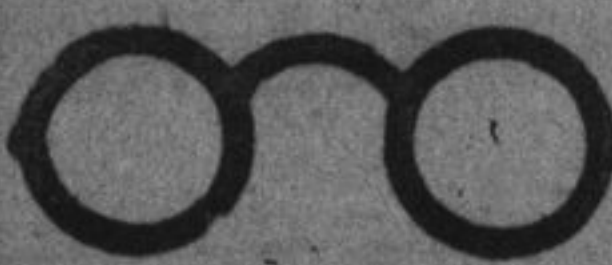

Foreigners in Large Numbers To Go Back Home. Edmonton, Feb. 19.—"One hundred thousand foreigners will be leaving Canada this year to go back to their former homes," said J. Normand, travelling passenger agent for the White Star and associated lines, who is on a trip through western Canada.

A RECENT ORDER

Farm Laborers Admitted From Canada Without Tax. Washington, Feb. 19.—Secretary of Labor Wilson has issued an order to the commissioner-general of immigration permitting farm laborers to cross the Canadian border into the United States without regard to head tax, passports or illiteracy.

Income Tax Will Include "Tips." New York, Feb. 19.—Walters, porters, barbers, bell boys and others who are lucky enough to get tips, must keep tabs on them and file the United States a "divy."

Woman Tried to End Life. New York, Feb. 19.—Knowing before the close of Trinity church, a woman, who gave her name as Maude Randolph, thirty-five years old, Los Angeles, California, attempted suicide by drinking poison.

Wheat Only Good For Food. Calgary, Feb. 19.—That there are about one million bushels of wheat that have been standing on sidings on the Edmonton, Duffagan and British Columbia railway since October and November last, and which is now possibly only fit for feed, was the statement of G. L. Race, president of the Swift River Board of Trade, who was in Calgary recently.

PUTS IN BIG CLAIM

Russia Sues U. S. Railway for \$20,000,000 Damages. New York, Feb. 19.—The former Russian Imperial Government is still a legal entity, according to a suit brought here in its name against the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company, seeking damages of a million and a half dollars for the loss of munitions and war supplies in the Black Tom Island explosion in 1916.

The Russian Government was a heavy loser by the explosion, which occurred on fourteen barges loaded with munitions and moored off the island in New York harbor. The entire loss was placed at \$20,000,000.

UNABLE TO LIVE ON HIS SALARY

Pastor of Exclusive Congregation in Detroit Goes into Real Estate. Detroit, Feb. 19.—Rev. Thomas G. Sykes, for ten years pastor of the exclusive Grosse Pointe Protestant church, announced his resignation, to become effective at once. Dr. Sykes has entered the real estate business because he was unable to support his family on his salary as a clergyman.

JAIL WITHOUT OPTION

For Infringement of Temperance Act in Manitoba. Winnipeg, Man., Feb. 19.—That in future persons convicted of breaches of the Temperance Act will face a term in jail without the option of a fine, was announced authoritatively at the Parliament Buildings yesterday.

Another measure which will be incorporated in the amendments to put fresh teeth into the temperance legislation will be a clause which will make it a crime for anyone to sell prescriptions given to him by a doctor.

Kerensky Imprisoned

London, Feb. 19.—Alexander Kerensky, the former Russian premier, whose regime was overthrown by the Bolsheviks in November, 1917, has been imprisoned in the Caucasus, according to a Central News despatch from Copenhagen quoting the Estonian newspaper, Varantias.
