The chairman said that they thought that, in regard to the Grand Trunk Pacific at least, they were entitled to be shown the same consideration as the Canadian Northern. "Often as this story has been repeated," continued the chairman, every few people in Canada have paid any attention. (Canadian Press Despatch) Ottawa, Feb. 20 .- Whether or not provision will be made at the coming session of parliament for the erection of new barracks to the re-organized Canadian permanent force is not yet known, but it is apparent that lack of barrack accommodation is causing the militia department the gravest concern. It is stated that only in two out of eleven points where units of the permanent force are stationed is the accommodation adequate, and at the remaining nine places it is either nil, inadequate, or unsuitable. 
