WAS BY STANDING VOTE THREE MONTHS IN JAIL

EXPRESSION OF REGRET BY WOMEN'S NATIONAL COUNCIL

A Report by the Citizenship Committee—Eligibility For Municipal Offices—To Post Dates of Meetings.

The local branch of the National Council of Women held its regular monthly meeting on Thursday afternoon, Feb. 19th, in the Committee room, city buildings, the president, Mrs. John Macgillivray, in the chair. Those present included Miss Machar, Miss Muckleson, Mrs. Lavell, Miss Roman, Mrs. Alexander Macphail, Mrs. McCallum, Mrs. Arthur Ellis, Mrs. Bruce Taylor, Mrs. W. F. Nickle, Mrs. Day, Mrs. Jordan, Miss Mowat, Mrs. Strachan, Miss Bajus, Mrs. Coleman, Mrs. Sander Calvin, Mrs. Kennedy, Miss Drummond.

It was moved by Miss Machar, seconded by Miss Roman, and carried by a standing vote: "That this Executive meeting, representing our local council, now place on record its warm appreciation of the long continued and faithful services rendered by our late Hon-President, Mrs. Hugh Fraser, who presided over its early growing years, and by her wise and kindly leadership, greatly promoted its social services in so many different directions."

In seconding the resolution, Miss Roman added her tribute of regard for the late Mrs. Hugh Fraser, with whom she had been officially connected for many years, in the local council.

Mrs. Bruce Taylor, convener of Citizenship committee, called attention to the following facts: "The difficulty in getting candidates for municipal office is not in finding women suited for civic work but that so many of those have not the necessary legal qualifications. This difficulty is not insurmountable and the council would urge the members of each society to activity along this line this year.

"Many questions are to be before our city council in its coming sessions, and several of these require that a by-law be passed by the property holders. It is of vital interest to the women of the community to have a thorough re-organization of the Kingston General Hospital, and few indeed are the women who do not wish to see G. Y. Chown's scheme of a free library realized. To the fulfilment of both these schemes it is necessary to pass a money by-law, and only those men or women assessed as owners of property can vote on a money by-law. It is therefore of paramount importance that women with broad vision and with a true love for the progress of the municipality in which they live should qualify themselves as quickly as possible.

"To be eligible for any municipal office whether on the council or on one of its standing committees, and to have a vote as regards the coming by-law it is necessary that your name should be on the voters' list of your municipality. This list is made up from the assessment roll by the city clerk, and is composed of all men and women, married or single, of 21 years of age, British subjects assessed at not less than \$400, or who pay taxes on an income of not less than \$400, (but only those assessed as owners of property can vote on money by-laws.)

"Women who are living in a house owned or leased by their husbands or fathers should ask their men-folk to make them a deed of gift giving them a share equal to at least \$400, in the property, in which case the assessment roll will show the man and woman as joint owners, and both their names should be put on the voters' lists. This would enable women not merely to vote at the municipal elections, but to hold office."

Mrs. Day reported that the health committee hoped to arrange for some moving pictures to be put on at one of the local theatres, which would have an educative value from the standpoint of health.

Mrs. Bruce Taylor moved that a register of prospective meetings of different societies and clubs be kept in the public library, to prevent the overlapping of dates of meetings or entertainments.

Mrs. Lavell seconded this resolution, which was carried unanimously, and Mrs. Kennedy announced that she had a frame at the library, suitable for just such a purpose, and that she would willingly post the dates of meetings, if a card were sent her by the secretary of societies interested. This is another instance of how the library may be used for "reference," and of how ready the obliging librarian is to be of service to the public. It is hoped that the societies will make use of this register.

NAPANEE MAN APPEALS.

Ice-Cutter Objects to Pay Damages For Boys' Deaths.

S. C. Denison, Napanee, brought an appeal before the court at Osgoode Hall in regard to the \$500 damages which he was ordered at the assizes to pay to Mr. and Mrs. Castaldi because their two sons, Antonio and Pappino, skated into an opening made by Mr. Denison's ice-cutting operations, and were drowned. The site of the fatality had been used for skating for thirty years, and there were some benches which looked like the goal posts used by the boys.

Find Employment for Six Million. Washington, Feb. 20.—Employment has been found for more than six million men and women by the United States employment service since its organization in January, 1918. Director-General Denmore announced.

During a two years' period more than nine million applications for jobs from individuals have been received, while requests from employers for labor were in excess of 13,000,000.

The cost of the service was estimated by Director-General Denmore at \$1.34 per placement.

Plan Gift For Denmark's King. Paderleben, Schleswig, Feb. 20. On the day of the official reunion of Schleswig with Denmark, the King will be presented with a reproduction in gold of the ancient gold of the horns immortalized by Denmark's greatest poet, Adam Gottlob Oehlenschlaeger.

FOR RECEIVING COAL WHICH HAD BEEN STOLEN FROM G.T.R.

Frederick Wells Admitted Stealing Some Harness, and Was Remanded Till Monday for Sentence—Police Found Missing Harness in Second-hand Shop.

Three months in jail was the sentence imposed by Magistrate Farrell on Rosa Cote, a young man, in the police court on Friday morning for having received stolen goods, knowing the same to have been stolen. The goods in question consisted of a quantity of coal which had been picked up on the Grand Trunk tracks by a young brother of Cote. The youngster was gathered in by a Grand Trunk constable in the local yards on Wednesday night. The accused pleaded guilty to the charge.

Frederick Wells, another young man, was charged with stealing some harness, the property of one, William Denney. He admitted his guilt, and was remanded till Monday for sentence.

Wells purloined the harness from Denney's stable. The theft was reported to the police, and Constable Leslie Clark located the missing harness in a second-hand shop, where Wells had disposed of it. Constable James Cotter rounded up the accused.

The case of W. J. Place, who is charged with having secured \$5 from Smith Bros., jewelers, under false pretences, was up for the second time. The accused stated that he had the money to make restitution, and the magistrate is giving him a chance to pay up.
