MEETS SECOND WIFE IN A GRAVE YARD
Much Married Man Sentenced to Penitentiary For Two Years.

Toronto, Feb. 21.—Frederick Matthews, who had a wife and six children when he married Hannah Schofield, a widow with two children, last December, was sentenced to-day to the penitentiary at Portmouth for two years. The widow stated that she first met Matthews in Prospect Cemetery while she was decorating her husband's grave. Matthews pointed out to her the grave of his wife, she stated. The first wife testified that Matthews had not contributed towards her support for seven years.

Prairie Fire 60 Miles Wide.
Buenos Aires, Feb. 21.—A great prairie fire, sixty miles wide, has swept through the territory of La Pampa, in the central part of the republic. Fifteen thousand sheep and much other live stock are reported to have perished, while the material damage is estimated at \$1,000,000. This conflagration is said to have been the biggest ever known in Argentina.

OBITUARY

The Late W. E. Wilson.
W. E. Wilson, born at Northport, Prince Edward county, about fifty-nine years ago, died in Dallas, Texas, on Jan. 24th, of heart trouble. Beside a wife and daughter, he is survived by an aged mother, a brother, R. F. Wilson, Northport, and a sister, Mrs. (Rev.) S. C. Noxon, Winona, Ont. The deceased's home was in New York City, and had been employed for many years by the Underwood Typewriter Company as special auditor. The remains were cremated in St. Louis and the ashes will be deposited in the family plot, in Glenwood cemetery, Picton.

Late Dr. M. F. Coglan.
Dr. M. F. Coglan passed away in Hamilton on Friday after a short illness from influenza and pneumonia. The deceased was thirty-nine years of age and a son of Isaac Coglan of Carleton Place. He was a graduate of Guelph agricultural college but took up the study of medicine and graduated from Queen's medical college in 1914. Upon his graduation he became superintendent of the General Hospital and served that institution for two years. He volunteered for service in the C.E.F. and served on medical boards in Kingston, Montreal and Toronto. Some months ago he took up the practice of his profession in Hamilton and was just becoming established when he was taken ill. His wife was visiting her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Leisner of University avenue, and was called to Hamilton and is at the present time ill herself. The deceased was a member of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Kingston. He is survived by his father and several brothers, who reside in western Canada. The remains reached the city from Hamilton via G.T.R. Saturday afternoon and the funeral took place to Cataragui cemetery, Rev. T. W. Savary of St. James Church officiating.

Died Very Suddenly.
Hugh McGill, son of Mrs. Mary McGill and brother of Jack McGill died in the Sydenham Military Hospital on Saturday morning about ten o'clock. The deceased who had been ailing for a few days went overseas with the First Canadian Division and served with the late Capt. George T. Richardson.
