NO GOVERNMENT BILL **UPON PROHIBITION** 

Two-Thirds Majority Measure Will Have To Be By

Private Members. (Canadian Press Despatch) Ottawa, Feb. 23.—There is no likelihood of a government bill this session to amend the Prohibition two-thirds majority before action is taken of the provincial referendum, it is authoritatively stated here. The

act provides that if, on a referendum a province decides by a simple majority that the importation of intoxicating liquors within its boundaries should be prohibited, the Dominion Government will then prohibit the importation into that province. The suggestion has been made that in-stead, a two-thirds vote should be required. The possibility of a private member's bill to this effect is mooted, but it is stated there has been no government measure under

SEIZURE OF DRUGS MADE IN VANCOUVER

In the House of a Chinaman, Head of Drug Selling Ring.

(Canadian Press Despatch). Vancouver, B.C., Feb. 23.—Drugs, the wholesale value of which is estimated at \$20,000, were seized by the police here last evening in the nouse of a Chinaman. Letters were also found from Spokane, Seattle Butte and Tacoma, requesting shipments, at prices varying from \$75 to \$80 an ounce.

The police believe they have captured the head of a drug-selling ring in the north-west. Diamonds, rings, watches and expensive furs, presumably bartered for drugs, were also discovered.
