## WON ACTION FOR ALIMONY

MRS. NETTIE REYNOLDS AWARDED \$150 A YEAR

Mrs. Reynolds Swore Her Husband Abused Her But He Denied Charge and Had Something to Say About Her Conduct.

"No doubt the plaintiff had a tongue, but most men going through life have had to become familiar with the thrashing tongue."

The above comment was made by Justice Logie, at the closing session of the Supreme Court, in giving judgment in the case of Mrs. Nettie Reynolds, vs. Frederick Reynolds, in which the plaintiff made a claim for alimony.

His lordship gave a verdict in favor of the plaintiff for \$150 a year, the money to be paid monthly.

A. B. Cunningham conducted the case for the plaintiff, C. R. Webster acted as counsel for the defence. The Reynolds family resided for several years on their farm near Odessa, afterwards moved into the village of Odessa, and later on came to Kingston. Mrs. Reynolds claimed she was forced to come to the city because she could not get along with her husband. She also declared that her husband assaulted her on several occasions, and that her health had been injured. She was afraid to live with him in the country.

Mrs. Reynolds swore that her husband spat tobacco juice on the floor, broke dishes and conducted himself in such a manner as to cause her to become very nervous.

Ebergon Reynolds, a son of the plaintiff, swore that he had seen his father strike his mother and also kick her.

Netta Reynolds, a daughter, also stated that she had seen her father strike her mother.

Giving evidence on his own behalf, Frederick Reynolds stated that he had been married for twenty-five years. He declared that he had never hurt his wife in his life, and had a few things to say about his wife. He said she was continually nagging at him to get him off the farm so that the children could attend the higher grade schools. He was compelled to sleep in a bed, "not fit for a hog," as the witness put it.

Defendant said he was 54 years old, and was in poor health. A doctor had told him that he should not work for a year.

Sydney McLaughlin said that Mrs. Reynolds had a habit of finding fault with everything her husband did. She appeared to be always picking a row.

Mr. Cunningham held that his client was entitled to alimony. It was shown by the evidence that Reynolds had abused his wife for a number of years. There was the evidence of the wife, a son and a daughter on this point. On the other hand, there was but the evidence of the defendant alone, who put in a denial. He submitted that the evidence against the defendant was overwhelming. The health of Mrs. Reynolds had been injured, and she had good reason for not wanting to go back on the farm.

His lordship stated that he considered the plaintiff was entitled to alimony, and made an order for her to receive \$150 a year, with costs of the court, the payments to be payable monthly.
